

GOODRICH POSTS ON COAST ROADS

Akron Firm Marking Routes to Aid Motorists—Notes From Auto Row

Many conveniences to promote motoring have been advanced from time to time by the various manufacturers identified with the industry, but not since the general appearance of the automobile has a firm undertaken such a public service enterprise as the national road marking work, which is now being done by the B. F. Goodrich company of Akron, O.

While this work is in progress in the east, Manager C. H. Miller of the Pacific coast Goodrich branch, with headquarters in this city, has started a corps of road markers in the field in southern California, and they will work north to the British Columbian line.

Eventually the work of marking the roads in the middle states will be taken up, and the final result will be that the Goodrich post will be seen along all the main routes connecting the Atlantic and Pacific coasts.

ALASKA COAL LAND CLAIMS UNDER BAN

Former Seattle Postmaster and Many Others Threatened With Forfeiture

SEATTLE, June 4.—Former Postmaster George M. Stewart; Richard M. Arms, former superintendent of the municipal electric plant, and 74 other Seattle persons, claimants of land in the Mackey coal group, Alaska, have been notified by the Juneau land office to show cause within 60 days why their locations should not be cancelled for failure to comply with the requirements of the United States statutes, which provide that a coal land locator must file application for patent within three years after date of location.

The Mackey group, the McAlpine group and the Bushnell group are known in the land office as the Detroit claims, because they lie contiguous and the Michigan-Alaska development company of Detroit was formed to acquire title to them all.

The three groups comprise 48,000 acres of land valued at \$50,000,000. The coal is lignite, but it crops out along the bluff overlooking salt water, and it will be easy to mine and ship the coal.

\$24,000,000 STATION OPENED IN CHICAGO

World's Second Biggest Depot Used by One Road

CHICAGO, June 4.—The Chicago and Northwestern railway's new passenger terminal, the second largest passenger terminal in the world used by only one road, was formally opened today.

Twenty acres of ground are covered by the buildings. The station yard covers 342,940 square feet, the trackage 252,600 square feet and the building section 67,750 square feet.

Sixteen tracks, with a capacity of 200 cars, enter the trainshed, giving the station a capacity of 250,000 passengers a day.

The total cost of the station was \$23,750,000, of which \$11,560,000 was expended for real estate. Construction was begun in February, 1910.

\$130,000 BOND ISSUE AWAITS LINDSAY VOTE

Sewerage and Water System Aim of Election

[Special Dispatch to The Call] LINDSAY, June 4.—Two bond issues totaling \$130,000, have been ratified and will be submitted to the voters the last of this month.

Of this amount \$75,000 will be used in the construction of sewers, including a sewer farm and septic tank system of disposal.

For the purchase of the present privately owned water system, \$55,000 will be devoted, or, failing in an agreement as to the proper price of this property, for the construction of a new plant.

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
