

Earthquake Kills Soldiers as Madero Nears Capital

DE LA BARRA EMBRACED BY REBEL CHIEF

Diaz' Conqueror and Successor Exchange Cordial Greetings at Meeting

No Disorder in City, Although Streets Are Packed With Great Throngs

Madero and Lieutenant Colonel Eduardo Hay were introduced to the president, as were the other members of his retinue.

The parting of the two men was cordial. They embraced in characteristic Mexican fashion and retired down the long corridor in opposite directions. As Madero passed on the stairs the federal officers on guard presented arms. Half way down the staircase Madero to the crowd, the national palace a coterie of small girls tossed flowers at the descending parties, and by the time Madero entered his carriage he was almost covered with roses and confetti.

STREETS RING WITH CHEERS

Escorted to the gateway by federal guards, Madero again encountered the cheering jam of enthusiastic crowds and continued his procession through the streets.

Tonight noisy celebrants filled the streets and paraded.

Madero was closely guarded throughout the day. At the station one of Madero's guards observed a man with his pistol drawn and, not hesitating to determine whether it was for salute or malice, he wrested the weapon from the man's hand and forced him back into the crowd. Several persons were injured in the press of the crowds, but there were no fatalities.

Following Madero in carriages were members of his family and chiefs from surrounding states. Among them was a company from Oaxaca, which was commanded by a 16 year old girl, Epepeana Chavarr, dressed in khaki suit, high top boots and wearing a sombrero trimmed in flowers.

Senior Madero on Friday will review the army of the south under Ambrosio Figueroa at Cuernavaca, and shortly after his return will go to Tehuacan for a two month rest.

"My stay in the City of Mexico," he said, "will depend upon the time it takes the president and myself to arrange details for the reorganization of the government. I shall act only in an advisory capacity."

HAPPENINGS IN MEXICO EVENTS ARE TITANIC

Madero makes triumphal entry into capital and great throngs cheer him and pelt him with flowers. Meeting between President de la Barra and insurrecto chieftain is cordial, and they embrace at parting. Madero speaks enthusiastically of De la Barra and declares his confidence that harmony will prevail in conduct of government. In speech he prophesies pan-American liberty, and Venezuelans cheer him.

"The spirit of liberty will not be satisfied and we all will really not be happy until in the whole American continent the reign of democracy is complete."—Extract from Madero's speech in Mexico City.

FOUR ARRESTED IN MEXICAN PLOT

Secret Service Men Find Big Cache of Ammunition in El Paso

EL PASO, Tex., June 7.—Four men, alleged to be members of the revolutionary forces in Lower California and recognizing Ricardo Flores Magon as their head, were arrested by United States secret service officers in El Paso today. Along with them were captured supplies of rifles, ammunition, bandages and hospital equipment, which had been secretly stored in a vacant house long under watch by government agents.

One of the rifles captured contained an inscription, "To Simon Berthold, Los Angeles, Cal." Berthold was one of the leaders of the lower California movement. He died several months ago of wounds received while fighting.

The arrests followed closely upon the announcement of Mexican officials in Juarez that plotters were at work to create a widespread anti-Madero movement out of the disaffection in Lower California.

Telegrams had been sent to Madero at Mexico City early in the day, advising him to investigate closely the loyalty of certain federal troops who were about to be sent to the Pacific coast.

In consequence, 1,200 federal troops were ordered not to go. A confidential military adviser of Madero, who was left here to look after plotters and who 10 days ago caused the arrest at Monterey, Mex., and another in El Paso, declared he had evidence that certain federal army officers were preparing to join the Lower California party and if possible to extend it to other parts of Mexico.

The men arrested today were: Preciliano Silva, who served a term in the federal prison on a charge of violating the neutrality laws in El Paso three years ago; Benjamin Silva, his son, who was held in jail six months; Reuben Silva, another son, and Thomas Vargas, follower of Magon. The house in which ammunition was found is said to have been recently constituted a meeting place for the anti-Madero party.

While investigating alleged anti-Madero plots in the custom house in Juarez today, Abraham Gonzales, provisional governor of Chihuahua, narrowly escaped being shot. A bullet fired by some unidentified person imbedded itself in a wall a few feet from where Gonzales was standing. Since the provisional governor himself had announced that \$10,000 was offered to prevent his reaching Chihuahua, the incident caused excitement, but Senator Gonzales declared he believed the bullet was not intended for him.

Advices from Chihuahua, located in the Artega district of Chihuahua, say that town is still under siege by the insurgents, who refuse to believe that peace has been declared. The people there have been cut off from supplies for eight weeks.

FAIR BUILDING TO COST \$750,000

Sacramento Valley Is Planning a Superior California Structure

SACRAMENTO, June 7.—An exposition building that will cost from \$500,000 to \$750,000, to be known as the Superior California building, will be erected at the World's fair in San Francisco in 1915 if the plan launched by the new executive committee of the Sacramento chamber of commerce in the Sacramento valley has been called for June 27 in this city.

The executive committee has figured that if all the counties set aside 2 cents on the \$100 for the next four years there will be an adequate fund with which to erect a splendid building to represent this part of the state instead of each county dotting the exposition with a small exhibit.

The Panama-Pacific exposition committee tomorrow will ask the supervisors to provide a 6 cent levy for advertising purposes and to set aside half of this for the main building.

66 KILLED IN MEXICO CITY IN EARLY MORNING QUAKE

Old Barracks Crumbles and Falls, Crushing Soldiers and Wives Beneath, and Temblor Plays Havoc in Poor Quarter

MEXICO CITY, June 7.—Sixty-three killed, 75 wounded; property loss \$100,000.

These are the net results of the earthquake which rent the capital this morning and injected a note of tragedy into what was expected to be a day of unaltered rejoicing. When the work of searching the ruins is completed it is possible that the list of dead will be lengthened somewhat, as hiding throughout the city there doubtless are many wounded, who, with traditional fear of the authorities and government hospitals are anxious to evade discovery.

WOMEN AMONG DEAD

No property of Americans was damaged, and with the exception of one Chinese killed, no foreigners were injured. In the barracks where the soldiers were killed, 12 women also lost their lives. They were the wives of the artillerymen. These women have the privilege of spending the nights within the walls of the barracks.

The barracks was an old structure, built a generation or more ago, but unlike many of the older edifices, its walls were comparatively thin. Several sleeping men, hurried them down through the floor on their comrades below. The bodies of 30 soldiers have been recovered. Three are missing and 15 were wounded, a few dangerously.

WIVES AID IN SEARCH

Those who escaped began the work of rescue at once. Women, whose soldier husbands were in the pile, waited in groups, while little brown children clung to their dresses and stared curiously at the scene. Ambulances carried the wounded to the military hospitals and the dead to Dolores cemetery.

Three blocks from the barracks the yards of the Mexican Central station, at which Madero had been scheduled to enter, presented another spectacle of the shock's intensity. There a long wall separating three yards from those of the Mexican railway was thrown down. A Mexican locomotive engineer was lying by his engine, crushed to death.

A warehouse of the Mexican Central is almost a wreck, one wall and a portion of the building having collapsed. About a third of the roundhouse was torn down. No casualties were reported here.

The victims were those whose homes were in cheaply built houses—shacks in most cases, whose walls had little power of resistance.

The fury of the shock was spent in the northwestern and western parts of the city. The greatest damage was in that quarter known as Santa Maria, although cracks in the pavement and

ALL DOUBT DISPELLED

If there was doubt in the minds of any onlookers as to the sentiment of the people in the capital toward Madero, it must have been dispelled by the cheer that accompanied his appearance in the entrance to the station.

Thousands packed the inclosure in front of the building, lined the fences and walls, roofs of houses and filled windows and balconies at every point which afforded a view of the entrance. These took up the shouts and it was in turn repeated by other thousands who packed the streets about and overflowed into the Plaza de la Reforma.

The coach to which Mr. and Mrs. Madero were escorted was drawn by four horses, which were managed by postillions in green jackets, white trousers, colonial wigs and green caps. With them rode Alfredo Robles Dominguez, chief of this military zone.

FLOWERS STREW PATH

Line of khaki clad horsemen made a line, albeit a somewhat dangerous one, with the rearing and plunging animals, through which the members of the party walked.

With great difficulty the mounted escort made way for the carriage through the gates and into the picturesque Plaza, where the triumphant ride of the national paladin began. Several hundred horsemen in broad brimmed hats and canvas suits, each with one, two or three belts of Mauser cartridges strapped upon him, followed.

CHEERING IS CEASELESS

People along the way, notwithstanding they had been holding their places of vantage since early morning, were in the best of humor. The progress of the carriage was slow, and many times the horsemen found it hard to make a path. Madero's horse and attendants, but always bowing and waving his hat in response to the "viva" that seemed never ending.

At the head of Avenida Juarez the parade swung to the left and instead of following the direct route to the palace, made its line of march conform to original plans made when it was expected the special would arrive at the national station, which is in another part of the city.

Along Avenida Juarez banks of seats had been erected. These were filled early in the morning, a large percentage of their occupants being women representing the best families of the capital.

CROWDS WAIT LONG

The change in the program caused these spectators hours more of waiting while the procession marched to the palace and back to San Francisco avenue. Avenida Juarez and to the Madero home, not far from the route which he arrived. Many tired of their vigil and left, but their places were quickly filled.

It was late in the afternoon when the crowds began to melt away, their appearance being hastened by a light rain.

All the streets through which the parade passed were gorgeous in bunting and flags of all nations.

Showers of confetti and myriads of streamers of paper tape descended upon the marchers from balconies and upper windows, while all along the route bunches of flowers were tossed into the Madero carriage. Mrs. Madero acknowledged the tributes with smiles and bows.
