## ROYAL EXCHEQUER IS LOST ON TRAIN

Railroad Officials Prevent Panic in Oroville by Finding It Quickly

## Merchants' Association Will Send Delegation to Big Carnival

Queen Marnell of the Oroville water carnival, who in civil life is Miss Marnell Dunne, daughter of Deputy Assessor R. H. Dunn of Butte county, arrived in the royal pageant Friday night. Miss Dunn was accompanied by Mrs. Edwin H. Orr, chairman of the coronation committee and a member of the Monday club, and by R. L. Vandermaalen, who was the originator of the water festival in the northern city three years ago.

The royal shoppers were almost the victims of a serious misfortune while changing cars. The purse which contained their funds was mislaid, and but for the prompt aid of the car officials, who located and returned the purse to them in a few minutes, the carnival in all probability would have had to be postponed.

As it is, the court wardrobe is being rapidly filled, the carnival colors, white and gold, being its distinguishing feature. The Merchants' association and the Los Angeles chamber of commerce are sending delegations to the carnival, and other cities which are following suit are Reno, Sacramento, Chico, Portola, Beckwith and Quincy, which is also providing a band and a baseball team.

The festivities will open on Friday with an automobile parade, and that night the river pageant and a ball in the open air pavilion will be held. Saturday will be occupied with various sports and the carnival will close with a second ball and the departure of the royal floats.

The king of the carnival will be Charles Helman. The four maids of honor who have been chosen by the queen are the Misses Mattie Webber, Alice Leggett, Mildred Powers and Harriet Helman. Little Miss Ruth Dunn, sister of the queen, and Miss Genevieve McGee will play the part of pages, and the prime minister will be George W. Braden. The other gentlemen in waiting have not yet been appointed.

**Oroville in Readiness**  
[Special Dispatch to The Call] OROVILLE, June 13.—With the street gaily decorated with flags and bunting, the water river illuminated with thousands of electric lights and every arrangement perfected, Oroville is in readiness for the thousands of visitors who will congregate here for the annual carnival on Friday and Saturday.

Reports from all over the Sacramento valley, from the mountain districts adjacent to Oroville and from San Francisco indicate that the crowd attending the carnival will be record breaking.

After a magnificent pageant down the Feather river, Queen Marnell and King Charles will be crowned on a great platform built over the Feather river. The pageant and coronation ceremony will be held both Friday and Saturday evenings.

**Boosters in Capital**  
[Special Dispatch to The Call] SACRAMENTO, June 13.—More than a hundred boosters for the Oroville water carnival arrived in Sacramento with a band this afternoon, and tonight paraded the streets and gave a band concert in the city park. The delegation came over the Northern Electric and was met at the station by a delegation from the Sacramento chamber of commerce. The boosters returned home late tonight.

**LOCK OF HAIR KEPT TEN MONTHS FOR EVIDENCE**  
Plaintiff Exhibits It in Suit Against S. P.

[Special Dispatch to The Call] FRESNO, June 13.—A lock of hair and a piece of human flesh were introduced as evidence in the case of J. A. Kraft against the Southern Pacific railroad before Judge Austin and a jury today.

The exhibits are said to show that Kraft was severely injured in a railroad wreck between Hanford and Coalinga on August 19, 1910. Despite the lapse of 10 months, the hair and scalp flesh had been preserved for use in the trial.

Kraft is suing the railroad company for \$19,920 damages. Although claiming that he had been injured to the extent of \$5,000, Kraft stated in his complaint that he reduced the amount three-fifths.

**DAVIDSON ACCUSES WIFE; SHE CHARGES DESERTION**

The complaint was filed by Davidson, who alleged that his wife has conducted a systematic method of annoying him. He avers that she made him cook his own meals. The wife filed a cross-complaint alleging desertion. The suit is being tried behind closed doors.

**THUGS WIELD SANDBAR AND ROB PEDESTRIAN**

Robber Takes Saloon Keeper's Watch and Cash and Patron's Money

[Special Dispatch to The Call] MARTINEZ, Cal., June 13.—A lone highwayman entered the ferry saloon near the Southern Pacific railroad depot at 10:25 o'clock Monday night, and forced the proprietor, Charles W. Pick, to hand over his watch and chain and the contents of the cash drawer while he held a revolver at his head.

The highwayman then robbed James Hamilton of \$21.50 and then made his escape. This morning word was received from Port Costa that the thief had boarded an east bound train there at 11 o'clock last night and the sheriffs of all the surrounding counties have been warned to be on the lookout.

He answers the description of the highwayman who had committed a number of holdups in Stockton and Livermore. The boldness of the fellow leads the officers to believe that he is the same person.

**WESLEY K. DE JARNETT IS DEAD AT COLUSA**

**GLIDDEN ALIENATION SUIT GOES OVER UNTIL FALL**  
Federal Court Delays Hearing of Los Angeles Scandal

NEW YORK, June 13.—The suit of Mrs. Jean I. Mackey Glidden, wife of Deputon Glidden of Los Angeles, Cal., for \$50,000 against Mrs. Gladys L. Lambert Woodward of this city, alleging alienation of her husband's affections, was put over until the October term by Justice Platt in the federal court today.

**U. S. S. PENNSYLVANIA ARRIVES**—Mare Island, June 13.—The cruiser Pennsylvania dropped anchor this afternoon at the light house, where it took on a quantity of supplies. The man-of-war will depart for Bremerton with 60 prisoners ordered transferred to the ship.

## TWENTY COUNTIES TO JOIN EXHIBITS

Northern California Auditorium at Panama-Pacific Exposition Is Planned

[Special Dispatch to The Call] SACRAMENTO, June 13.—A northern California auditorium that will contain the exhibits of 20 counties in this part of the state will be established at the Panama-Pacific exposition in 1915, if the plan launched by the executive committee of the Sacramento chamber of commerce materializes. Delegates from 20 counties will attend a meeting here June 27 to take up the question of raising \$700,000 for such a building. It is proposed to ask the various boards of supervisors to devote half of the 6 cent tax on the \$100,000 valuation permitted by law for advertising toward a building fund for the next four years. The plan has already been put before the Sacramento supervisors, and they are to give an answer on Thursday.

The fruit shippers are unanimously in favor of the plan as a means of promoting the interests of northern California.

**FOUR SONS RETURN WITH DOUBLE SURPRISE**  
Wedding Announcements Made by Two Physicians

The eldest son, Dr. Harry O. Hund, announced to his friends that he would marry Miss Louise Haschke, daughter of a Brooklyn manufacturer. The second son, Dr. Walter J. Hund, announced that Miss Carmen Glough of San Francisco would be his bride.

Dr. Harry Hund will join his father in medical practice at Ross. Fred and Walter Hund will become manufacturing chemists, and the youngest, Edwin J. Hund, will go abroad again after his vacation to complete his studies.

**LADS TRY TO PRY GOLD FROM DEAD MAN'S TEETH**  
Body Unearthed in Old Cemetery by Trench Diggers

[Special Dispatch to The Call] RENO, June 13.—Children attempting to tear the gold from the teeth of a body which had been unearthed in a deserted cemetery by workmen digging a trench was the startling discovery made today.

The lads had seen the bones lying beside the trench, and a gleaming yellow metal tooth crown exposed to view had attracted them. They were busily engaged in prying out the gold when they were discovered.

All the bodies in the old cemetery were supposed to have been removed. The remains will be reburied today.

**LOS ANGELES PROSECUTOR ON SECRET VISIT EAST**  
Confers With Indianapolis Authorities About McNamara

INDIANAPOLIS, June 13.—John D. Fredericks, prosecuting attorney for Los Angeles county, Cal., it was learned today, is in this city conferring with Prosecutor Baker in regard to the alleged kidnaping and dynamiting investigation here following the arrest of J. J. McNamara, secretary of the structural iron workers, and his extradition to California.

It could not be learned how long he has been here or when he would return to California.

**U. S. PLANS WORLD'S MOST MODERN WIRELESS PLANT**  
Three Towers to Be Erected With 3,000 Mile Radius

WASHINGTON, June 13.—Bids for three gigantic steel towers for a wireless station of the navy department will be opened on June 17.

The towers will be erected on the government reservation at Arlington, Va. The tallest of the three will stand 600 feet. The other will each be 450 feet high.

The wireless plant will be the most complete in the world and will have a radius of about 3,000 miles.

**TEXAS HOLDS PRISONER FOR KILLING IN NEVADA**  
Vagrancy Charge Is Placed Against Man in Juarez

EL PASO, Tex., June 13.—Formal charges of vagrancy were made today against George Wilson, wanted in Reno, Nev., on a charge of murder. This action was taken to prevent Wilson's release on a writ of habeas corpus. Wilson, who was in the Juarez jail when the insurgents captured that city May 19, was delivered to the American authorities and is being held for Reno officials.

**I. O. O. F. TO BUILD THEATER**—Vallejo, June 13.—San Pablo lodge No. 45, I. O. O. F., will erect a \$14,000 theater in Virginia street this summer for Manager Gus Olan of the Sullivan & Cusidine circuit.

**COUPLE SECRETLY MARRY**—Vallejo, June 13.—Miss Rose Emma of this city and Jesse Smith of Petaluma were married in this city several days ago by Rev. Father Cline, O. P. The fact was kept secret until today. The young couple will make their home in Petaluma.

## AMATEUR AVIATOR LOSES HIS HAND

Paul Butler Is Painfully Injured by the Propeller of His Aeroplane

[Special Dispatch to The Call] VALLEJO, June 13.—An amateur aviator and motor boat enthusiast, lost his left hand here this afternoon as the result of getting it caught in the propeller of his aeroplane, which he recently constructed at his home here. The hand was so terribly lacerated that the doctor at the hospital immediately amputated it. Butler is well known throughout the state and was to have taken part in an aviation meet at Antioch on the fourth of July.

He is the owner of the motor boats Aquatic and Marathon, and has raced in San Francisco bay as well as in the Sacramento river.

**POLICE FRUSTRATE HIGH SCHOOL HAZING**  
Juniors Kidnap Seniors, but Are Foiled by Authorities

[Special Dispatch to The Call] SANTA BARBARA, June 13.—A trio of high school juniors were caught by the captain of police this evening as they were leaving his city with two seniors whom they intended to hase. Stanley Dickover and Westrop Figg-hoblyn, members of the class which is to be graduated Friday, had been warned that party of juniors had planned to kidnap them and prevent the carrying out of a number of preliminary exercises tomorrow and the next day. To defeat the plan of the juniors, Dickover and Figg-hoblyn went to the police station to request a bodyguard.

While Figg-hoblyn was in the office of the chief of police, Dickover, who was waiting outside, was grabbed by three juniors, gagged, handcuffed and dumped into an automobile. Captain of Police Kelly, in another machine, caught up with the fleeing auto, ordered the release of the senior and accompanied him to his home. Figg-hoblyn was escorted home by Chief Ross. The police learned tonight that the juniors had rented a house near Summerland, 12 miles south of here, and intended to lock the two seniors in it until after the commencement exercises.

**WITNESS OF SHOOTING OF CAPTAIN COOK FOUND**  
[Special Dispatch to The Call] SANTA ROSA, June 13.—Colonel John C. W. Brooks, coast artillery corps, Presidio of San Francisco, arrived today to take the deposition of Arthur Muehl, alias Wentworth, witness to the shooting of Captain Frank Cook, United States army, by a watchman named Hayes in the Spreckels market several months ago.

Captain Cook is being tried before a general court martial at the Presidio for conduct unbecoming an officer. Muehl was the only person who saw the affair and was intended as the star witness for the defense, but he disappeared.

The whereabouts of Muehl would be a mystery still if he had not been shot several days ago by John Halterbach. He is not expected to live. If he dies the army authorities will call Dr. J. E. Maddux as a witness, as he took a statement of the Cook affair from the dying man immediately after he was shot.

**MISS ELIZA ROTTANZI DIES IN SWITZERLAND**  
Word has been received by relatives in this city that Eliza Rottanzi, a sister of the late Dr. T. A. Rottanzi, a prominent physician, who left here January 20, died in Geneva, Switzerland, May 27.

Eliza Rottanzi was the daughter of Dr. A. Rottanzi, a native of Faido, Switzerland, who was also a practitioner in San Francisco for many years. Several years ago she, with her sister, Adele, went abroad to live. She is survived by three sisters and a brother, Mrs. A. Gherini, Mrs. L. Steffani and Ettore Rottanzi, all of San Francisco, and her sister Adele, who resides abroad.

## SAN JOAQUIN ROAD TO BE BUILT SOON

Construction Work on Valley Electric Will Start With Engineer's Arrival

[Special Dispatch to The Call] STOCKTON, June 13.—As soon as N. H. Cowell, supervising engineer of the San Joaquin Valley electric railroad, arrives from the east construction work on the line which is to be built between Stockton and Modesto will begin. There are 300 tons of rails and 30,000 ties on hand. The rails are in Oakland awaiting orders.

**FRUIT GROWERS WARNED AGAINST THREE PESTS**  
Yellow Insect With Wide Wings Like Housefly

[Special Dispatch to The Call] SACRAMENTO, June 13.—A warning was issued to the fruit growers of California today by State Horticultural Commissioner Jeffery, who cautioned them against the entrance into their orchards of three dreaded pests—the Morelos orange maggot of Mexico, the Mediterranean fruit fly and the melon fly, which preys on all kinds of fruit. According to Jeffery there is grave danger of the Mediterranean fly finding its way into California orchards. It has appeared in the Hawaiian islands, and the islanders have warned the state commission to watch for it. It is one of the hardest insects to eradicate, as it attacks practically every species of fruit. In New Zealand and Australia a futile attempt has been made against it. It is about the size of a house fly, yellow in color and broad wings. Its introduction into California orchards would be a great menace to fruit crops, says Jeffery.

**OAKLAND MINISTER HAS ACCEPTED STOCKTON CALL**
