LONG SHOT LOSES OUT IN STRETCH

Olympic Track and Field Men Will Start East for National Championships

Final arrangements were made yesterday for the Olympic track team to leave for the east Saturday to take part in the National track and field championships which will be held at Pittsburg, June 30 and July 1.

Word was received yesterday from Trainer Christie, who is at present in the east, that he has found suitable quarters for the team to train at Kiskiminetus Springs, Saltsburg, Penn. S. Bellah and W. Wyman are already located at the springs with Christie and are working out in preparation for the meet. Christie notified the club that he is now ready to receive the remainder of the team and asks that they start as soon as possible.

Captain-Manager Pete Gerhardt will leave Saturday for Saltsburg accompanied by O. Snedigar, McCauley, Campbell, Horine and Morris, the two latter being Palo Alto athletes.

These men will proceed direct to the training grounds, which is about 50 miles from Pittsburg, and will put in about 10 days' training before the meet comes off. Ralph Rose, the holder of the world's shotput record, is to leave here early next week, and will arrive at the training camp a few days after the Olympic club team that if they took part in the meet at Pittsburg they would be ineligible to compete for their varsity next year. The men, therefore, returned here, not wishing to endanger their status for the conference meet. Now, however, it seems that the rule was not put in the local athletes correctly and an effort is being made to get into form for the event.

KLAUS TAKES ON SULLIVAN TONIGHT

Montana Boy Has Chance for Immediate Fame if He Can Down Pittsburgher

Frank Klaus, the Pittsburgh middle weight and runner up for the world's championship title, will make his Pacific coast bow this evening at Piedmont pavilion in Oakland against Montana Dan Sullivan. This bout is without doubt the most important one carded in a transbay ring since that night nine years ago when Jimmy Britt sprang late instant fame by beating Toby Irwin in 15 rounds.

Klaus looks every inch a great fighter. He is a stocky, well-proportioned man with great shoulders and arms and small legs and body, he resembles in a measure the late Stanley Ketchel. He is a bit short for a middle weight, but what he lacks in height he more than makes up in physical power and the puncher of powerful ability, and one glance at him readily convinces the fans that the sensational work attributed to the Pittsburgh boy back in his home town was not press agent puff.

Klaus has had some work of good steady training over in Oakland, and yesterday he looked fit and ready to travel 40 rounds in one six. His fighting face was set and his muscles hardened. He shaped up like a man in absolutely perfect condition.

In Sullivan, the Smoky City lad meets a tough, though inexperienced gladiator, a man who is game to the core and who will stand a world of beating. Though only a novice at the game, Sullivan has delivered every time he started and does not know the meaning of the word defeat.

Sullivan was discovered by Baron Long, the former Louisville promoter and a man well versed in affairs of the ring. Klaus picked Sullivan up as a comer and has held him under his wing for more than a year. Sullivan has not figured to get on with some of the near champions in the middle weight division, but up to the present time all his efforts have proved futile.

The Montana man has all in the world to gain and but little to lose. His reputation has not yet been established, therefore, a defeat at the hands of Klaus does not figure to work much of a hardship on him. But should Sullivan beat the easterner, he will immediately loom up as one of the most sensational performers in the ring today.

Klaus, on the other hand, has everything to lose and but little to gain. His reputation has been established. He managed to get his own against Ketchel, Papke and the best of them over the short distance route in the east. He proved to be equal to every emergency that has presented itself up to the present time and, naturally, he figures that he will be able to get away with Sullivan without serious difficulty.

Sullivan will have it on Klaus in weight. The boxers are to make 160 pounds, a mark which just about suits the Montana man, though Klaus has seen used to entering the ring at 154 pounds. Six pounds makes a whole lot of difference, but rather than have any trouble with this, his first match on the coast, Klaus gave way to Sullivan.

The men will box straight marquis of Queensberry protection, each protecting themselves at all times. Eddie Smith, one of the most competent and popular ring officials in the country, will referee. Smith has talked the rules over with both men, and as they seem to understand each item perfectly, it is not expected that his task will be a difficult one. Both men are hard hitters, and a knockout will not surprise any of the fans.

Klaus will be handled by his manager, George Engle; Matty Baldwin and Baron Long; his brother Jack and Freddie Welsh. The men will weigh in at 3 o'clock on the other side of the bay.

In addition to the main event Match Maker Al Moffatt has arranged a rattling good card of six and four round bouts. The special attraction will be a six round setto between Ray Baughman, the Petaluma bantam weight, and Kid Barnes of New York. There will also be a six round bout between Ray Campbell and Jim Horner. The four round events will be provided by Jack Schiff and Bill Donovan and a pair of well known Oakland boys.

He is now in the best of health and should be fit for the battle of his life when he starts against the relationship of the two tomorrow evening.

Baldwin is a fast boxer, as well as a tough, sturdy fellow in the mixups. He is a fairly well rounded man, but he is one of those brutes who is always willing to take two punches for the privilege of landing one, and he never has been known to back up.

Welsh is still working away and yesterday he went through his usual routine of his sparring mates. The clever foreigner works faster and faster as the days roll by. He is with-out doubt one of the most marvelous boxers the fans have ever seen here. All those who have watched him work out will testify to this, and he will certainly will depend on his speed and his piston like left hand against Baldwin. There is but slight chance of his scoring a knockout. He seems to realize this, too. Welsh has gone against the Boston boy in a six round bout before and he knows just how tough Baldwin is. Therefore it is not at all likely that he will take any chances in the mixups.

BUTCHERS HOLD EXCITING MEET

Fat Men Prove Heroes in One Lap Race and Every One Loves Them

"Butchers' day" at Shell Mound park, yesterday was pronounced by the officials of the gathering to be one of the most successful ever held by the San Francisco and Alameda county butchers. Several thousand members with their families and friends attended the affair, the main feature of which was the program of athletic sports conducted under the jurisdiction of the Pacific athletic association. Besides these games there were races for members of the Butchers' exchange, which proved to be the most exciting on the program.

The most amusing race of the day, and the one that caused the greatest interest among the beholders, was the fat men's race. To be eligible for this event the entrant had to tip the beam at 200 pounds and other promising players for the race, which was lined up around the track. At the gun J. Kerwin, a mid-set of 250 pounds, jumped into the lead. He held his place for the first 75 yards, but he was evidently not in for the hard race A. Crowl gave him. Crowl weighs 250 pounds, and being in better form than Kerwin, he took the pole and had an easy time for the rest of the race, running like a veteran and winning by five yards. A. Schruoker, a tiny man of 230 pounds, won third money.

The races held by the amateur athletes brought out large fields, and the competition was keen. In the 175 yard event heats had to be run off, the first two men in each qualifying for the final. This race was a hot one, Hoenisch of the Pastimes and Gerhardt of the Olympic club, with the honor finally going to the former. Hoenisch took the lead from the start and was never headed, though Gerhardt made a great effort to catch him in the final few yards.

In the mile run a field of 10 men got the starter. The back markers set a good pace and were well up with the limit men in the sixth lap. At this stage Williams of the Olympic club, who had come up from the 40 yard mark, took the lead and held it for the rest of the race. He was challenged by Wright in the last lap, but easily shook him off and won.

The 325 yard handicap went to Martin of the Irish-American club. In this race there was considerable hostility, most of the men being mixed up in the affair.

In the 850 yard handicap the best times were for second place, between O'Shea and Hanford. Greer of the Pastimes won the event with ease, but it was left to O'Shea and Hanford to furnish the excitement, the St. Ignatius last just getting the place by a few inches.

Both field events, the high and the broad jumps, were won by Gates, the Sacramento athletic club entry. He jumped in good style.
