

WORK SOON STARTS ON U. S. STRUCTURE

Architect's Drawings Just Received Show a 3 Story Marble and Granite Pile

Colonnade to Face Pine Street and Open Space to Surround the Whole

Complete plans and drawings of the new United States treasury for San Francisco, received yesterday from the east, give assurance that this important building will be begun soon.

The structure will be erected on the southwest corner of Sansome and Pine streets, with the main front consisting of a massive colonnade and entrance on Pine.

The plans of the government's architect, J. Milton Dyver of Cleveland, O., provide for a handsome building on classic lines. The height will be about 45 feet, admitting of three stories. It will cost \$500,000.

The classic style of the building will make it in harmony with many of the other financial and business structures of the neighborhood, such as the Bank of California, at Sansome and California streets; the A. B. Spreckels building, at Bay and California; the Ballinger-Guthrie building, at California street; the Security savings bank, in Montgomery, and the Savings Union, Union Trust, Gibraltar bank, Metropolitan Life and other buildings in which large financial institutions of the city are housed.

The treasury site, which was bought two and a half years ago from the Vanderbilt estate, has a frontage of 137 1/2 feet in Sansome street and 157 1/2 in Pine, and reaches back to Burnett place in the rear.

A 25 foot alley has been set aside from the Vanderbilt property in Pine street adjoining the treasury site on the west, which will be known as Treasury place. A 25 foot strip will be left as a passageway on the south side, so that the building will stand in an open place, widely separated from other buildings.

As the initial appropriation for the building has already been made, it is thought construction work will be begun at once.

Berkeley Improvement Club Opposes \$50 Warrant

BERKELEY, June 22.—Declaring that they were unalterably opposed to the payment of a warrant for \$50 to Chester H. Rowell, editor of the Fresno Republican, for delivering the commencement address at the Berkeley high school, the Longview improvement club last night passed a resolution to that effect.

The resolution was as follows: "Resolved, that as Superintendent Bunker assumes all responsibility in regard to Mr. Rowell being paid \$50 for his speech at the commencement, we also assume the payment of the same, as the club is unalterably opposed to the funds of this city being used in this manner."



BROKER RUSHES TO AID ACCUSED WIFE

Epstine Unable to Account for Spouse's Arrest for Shoplifting

RENO, June 22.—H. E. Epstine, a prominent broker of Tonopah, passed through this city tonight on his way to San Francisco to investigate the facts surrounding the arrest of his wife on a charge of shoplifting in that city. OROVILLE PLANS 2 NEW FACTORIES

Furniture and Trunk Concerns to Employ 275 Persons Projected

[Special Dispatch to The Call] OROVILLE, June 22.—J. W. Fletcher, who is at the head of a company to establish a furniture factory in this city, was in Oroville yesterday in conference with Secretary N. B. Crane of the chamber of commerce. An option upon a factory site has been obtained.

It is the intention to establish both a furniture and a trunk factory here. It is estimated that the former will give employment to 200 persons and the latter will employ 75, about 20 per cent of whom will be women and girls.

Arrangements have already been made with the largest wholesale furniture house on the coast by which the latter agrees to take the product of the factory.

AXTELL DEFENSE IS PROBLEMATIC

Mystery Surrounds Tactics of Counsel for Editor in Murder Case

NAVY THEFT BARED BY CHIEF YEOMAN

Accused's Confession Implicates Paymaster's Clerk Before Court Martial

N., listened to the advice of Attorney William O'Donnell of Vallejo when he was arrested on board the receiving ship Independence on March 23 last, the navy court martial board, which he is appearing before at the yard this week, would not have much chance of convicting him of any of the charges filed against him. Bell put up a hard legal battle to save his client, and had quite a wordy tilt with Judge Advocate Salladay, U. S. M. C.

According to Helppern's confession Paymaster's Clerk Fuller was the plottor of the unlawful transactions and on one or two occasions he says Fuller kept all of the proceeds.

Pippin, the accused paymaster, was not the stand this morning, but was not asked to answer any questions that would injure his case.

Governor May Appoint Cook Agricultural Commissioner
