PHYSICIAN'S WIFE GUARDS CHILDREN

Mrs. Clark Says She Will Seek Divorce if Husband Interferes

ALAMEDA, June 27.—Mrs. Ivy Clark, wife of Dr. J. Emmet Clark, former president of the board of health, who says that her husband, now in Sacramento, left her for Mrs. Florence Robinson, a trained nurse, declares that if the physician attempts to obtain the custody of any of their three sons she will seek a divorce on the ground of desertion.

The separation of the Clarks has attracted general attention in this city, where both are widely known. The physician was affiliated with a number of fraternal organizations, among them being the Eagles, Moose, Woodmen, Order of America, Maccabees, Workmen and Elks. When he left her in April for Sacramento, he arranged for the transfer of several of his memberships to her in the capital city. Doctor Clark was at one time a state officer of the Epworth league and a member of the Epworth league of the First Methodist Episcopal church. Mrs. Clark says that after her husband and Mrs. Robinson became friendly he gave up church going and also discontinued saying grace at the family table. Mrs. Robinson, according to Mrs. Clark, came here from San Bruno, where she has relatives, and entered the White Cross hospital, conducted by Doctor Clark, in the city. She was connected with the institution when it became financially embarrassed and went out of business.

NEW PLAN SUGGESTED FOR MEETING EXPENSES

Sliding Scale Favored by Chamber of Commerce

OAKLAND, June 27.—At a meeting of the directors of the chamber of commerce today plans were discussed for raising \$20,000 a year by subscriptions for the running expenses of the organization. E. B. Bull, chairman of the membership committee, submitted a plan calling for subscriptions of from \$15 to \$50 a month from the larger corporations, smaller sums from the smaller enterprises associated with the chamber and the regular monthly membership fee of \$1 a month from individual members.

ELECTRIC TRAINS ON WEBSTER STREET LINE

Steam Service Will Be Entirely Replaced Soon

OAKLAND, June 27.—An electric train took the place of the steam train this morning on the Webster street line, and throughout the day the new electric service was in operation. The electric trains were taken off late in the afternoon, but it is expected that in a few days the new service will be running along smoothly enough to be made permanent. It has been made permanent on the south side local line in Alameda, where the electric trains have been running for several weeks with success. Electric trains are also running on the Lincoln avenue branch, but not regularly as yet. The electric service on the other local lines of the Southern Pacific will be phased rapidly.

TRACTION COMPANY RETAINS FRANCHISE

New Commission to Deal With Twelfth Street Question

OAKLAND, June 27.—The problem of restraining the Oakland traction company and Key Route from operating coupled cars in the city has been bequeathed to the new commission by the old council, which last night permitted President Pendleton to withdraw his motion to reconsider an ordinance granting to the traction company a franchise in East Sixteenth street. Pendleton proposed to hold up the East Oakland franchise unless the Key Route and traction companies agreed to apply for a franchise for coupled cars in Twelfth street and to pay the city for the privilege. The legality of such action being questioned, Pendleton withdrew his motion.

FOUR MORE JURORS IN DALTON CASE

Taking of Testimony Against Accused Assessor Expected to Begin Today

OAKLAND, June 27.—Taking of testimony against Henry P. Dalton, assessor of Alameda county, who is under indictment for accepting a bribe of \$5,000 from the Spring Valley water company for agreeing to lower the corporation's assessment by \$2,500,000, will probably begin tomorrow. Four more jurors were secured today to try Dalton, making nine in all. The prosecution has exhausted all its peremptory challenges but one and so has the defense. The remaining three jurors should be secured tomorrow unless something unforeseen occurs.

The following were examined today and excused: James H. Perkins, because of a fixed opinion; Frank J. Adams, by the prosecution; B. D. Campbell, by the prosecution; Thomas J. Wise, Fred J. Lehrs, W. Parsons and William Parrott, by the defense.

Assistant District Attorney Hynes protested vehemently several times that he called the "vicious, unprofessional and ungentlemanly conduct" of Attorney Charles H. Fairall, Dalton's chief counsel. Judge Brown on several occasions sustained Hynes.

MISSING BOY WAS DROWNED IN BAY

Father Finds Body in Estuary Near Where Boat Was Capsized

OAKLAND, June 27.—The body of Arnaldo Ravendini, 9 years old, who disappeared four days ago from his parents' home at 612 Filbert street, was recovered this forenoon by his father, Manuel Ravendini, from the estuary at the foot of Oak street, where it has been learned the lad was drowned on the day of his disappearance.

Ravendini reported the disappearance to the police this morning. Then he went along the water front, where the boy had been accustomed to play, and learned that he had rented a row-boat at Taylor's wharf and that later the boat had been found floating capsized. The father obtained a boat and began a hunt for the body, which he found near the Oak street landing. He hoisted the body to the Oak street mooring, where it was taken in charge by the coroner's office.

ELECTRIC LIGHT RATE IS REDUCED

Berkeley Householders Benefited by the City Council

BERKELEY, June 27.—Acting on the written report of Prof. Clarence L. Cory, head of the department of mechanics at the University of California, the city council, at a meeting this morning, reduced the electric lighting rate from 9 cents to 8 1/2 cents per kilowatt hour. A saving of about 6 per cent for the small house holder will result from the revised schedule.

Mayor Hodghead replied that the company now received a net profit of 7.98 per cent. The new rate, according to Hodghead, will allow a profit of 6 per cent on the investment, with provision for depreciation of the plant. The bond of Mayor Elect J. Stitt Wilson in the sum of \$10,000 was approved by the council today.
