COMMERCE NEEDS BROAD WHARF

Mayor Mott Asked to Have City Refuse Deposited at Another Point

OAKLAND, June 27.—The directors of the chamber of commerce at their regular meeting this morning adopted a resolution recommending that Mayor Mott and the board of commissioners take steps to obtain another place for the discharge of garbage instead of the foot of Broadway, which is now being used.

This action was taken because of the increase of the harbor transportation facilities at this point by the Southern Pacific company. The chamber of commerce decided that the change also should be made so that the city could use the Broadway wharf for commercial purposes and in this way increase the city's revenue.

1,000 CHILDREN TO BE AT PLAY ON CAMPUS

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ROBBERS WAIT WITH VICTIMS FOR CAR

Stop With Men They Held Up Rather Than Walk to Town

[Special Dispatch to The Call] OAKLAND, June 27.—Two masked robbers forced their way into the sleeping quarters at the Sunrise laundry, 4101 East Fourteenth street, at 2:30 o'clock this morning and robbed the eight Japanese employees in the place of \$42 and several watches. Then the robbers decided to wait for the first streetcar in town.

So they seated themselves and with their revolvers guarded the Japanese, who had been lined against a wall while their clothes were searched. The thieves finally permitted the victims to return to their bunks, and there they sat until daybreak, when the first car was heard. Leaving the laundry together the thugs escaped, the Japanese fearing to follow them.

It is believed that the desperate pair were the same men who held up a laundry several months ago in another part of the city.

BOARD PREPARES TIDELAND LEASES

Officials and Occupants of Shore Property Agree Upon Rental Terms

OAKLAND, June 27.—At a conference held today at Mayor Mott's office, the board of public works and attorneys for occupants of East Oakland tidelands recently ceded to the city by the state, completed the form of leases which will be entered into between the city and the occupants.

The state grant requires the city to lease for 25 years at nominal consideration the lands which were improved by firms now using them, the improvements having been made during the tenure of the now abandoned Stratton patent.

The bill granting the lands was prepared by the city attorney and sent to the senate. There amendments were made providing that the renewals shall be governed by the terms stated in the lease. This phase was something of an obstacle, which at City Attorney Ben F. Woolner's suggestion was surmounted, by writing into the leases provisions that the renewals shall be fixed by arbitration.

Present at the conference were the mayor, City Attorney Woolner and City Engineer E. C. Turner for the city; Attorney and Attorney J. Church, counsel for the occupants of the tidelands in East Oakland basin.

The ordinance authorizing the board of public works to lease the lands was given final passage last night by the city council. The city will derive only nominal revenue under the requirements of the state grant, the total amounting to about \$3,200 a year.

DOCTOR BARROWS TO STUDY IN THE SOUTH
