LIFE DUPLICATES FICTION OF SEA Seven Days Did Gallant Crew of Good Bark Puritan Man the Pumps and Then For Twelve More They Battled In Open Boat

"Storm swept by a South Sea hurricane, seven days at the pumps in a leaking bark, 12 days in an open boat without water, parched by the sun and delirious from exhaustion," sounds like a bit of old sea fiction, but it is the conservative report of Captain Frank W. Chapman of the English bark Puritan, who arrived here yesterday from Tahiti on the Mariposa.

The Puritan was 28 days out from Newcastle carrying 3,500 tons of coal when it ran into a series of tropical hurricanes that put every seam in the old bark to the severest test. Finally a seam parted and the water came in so fast that it drove the men from the pumps.

SHONTS SAILS DOWN BAY TO MEET FAMILY

[Special Dispatch to The Call] NEW YORK, July 31.—Theodore P. Shonts, president of the Interborough company, went down the bay on a revenue cutter today and greeted his family, returning from Europe, most affectionately. In the party were Mrs. Shonts and two daughters, the Duchess de Chaulnes and Miss Marguerite Shonts and the infant Duc de Chaulnes, whose father died a few months after his marriage.

"Then for 12 days we were in open water with plenty of food and little water. We were hungry enough, but we could not eat because it only made us thirstier. Some of the men were sun-struck, one was delirious and we had to tie him down." Collins, the second mate, never asked for a drop of water, but his tongue was so thick he could scarcely speak and was coated so that he had to scrape it. When we asked him if he wanted water he would say, 'No, you men drink the water.' He was an Australian and one of the grittiest men I have ever seen.

McMangal, confessed dynamiter and alleged confederate of the accused McNamara brothers, was arrested tonight on a citation issued at the behest of the grand jury, charging him with contempt. He refused to answer questions regarding his knowledge of the alleged dynamiting. Behm was released on bonds of \$1,000 to appear tomorrow.

MOROCCO SITUATION STILL UNCHANGED German Government Asks and Receives Explanation From Great Britain

BERLIN, July 31.—The return of Emperor William to the capital has not affected the Moroccan negotiations, contrary to intimations in the Paris papers that his majesty would change Foreign Minister von Kiderling-Waechter's policy. The emperor, according to an official statement today, received a report on the negotiations, but no details have been given out.
