take effect between now and the first of the month. It has been reported that a specified reduction of 12 1/2 per cent of the forces of the company would be made. It is not known positively as yet what the reduction will be, and no definite proportion has been set. The forces will be reduced as the situation demands.

The order for the layoff is due in part to the summer decline in business. It is a rule in railroad operation that the operating expenses must bear a certain ratio to the earnings. During the last few months the expenses have exceeded what they should be in proportion to the earnings and it has been deemed necessary to retrench.

INHUMAN CONDUCT
CHARGED TO CREW

Streetcar Said to Have Kept on Its Way After Man Was Run Over

Witnesses Declare That Victim Was Passed Again on Return Trip

In the killing of H. J. Johnson of 1533 J street, by a Parkside car at Twentieth avenue and I street at 12:30 o'clock yesterday morning, was involved the most inhuman treatment, according to Frank Schmitz of 1388 Twentieth avenue, who witnessed the accident from his bedroom window.

Schmitz telephoned for an ambulance and Johnson died later at the Central emergency hospital. An autopsy found that his skull was fractured, right arm amputated, six ribs broken, right hip dislocated, and body generally mangled, with internal injuries and hemorrhage.

Motorman Anderson was arrested and charged with manslaughter. He was released on \$50 bail. Anderson denied having run over Johnson, claiming that he must have been hit by an automobile. F. E. Mack, conductor on the car, also claimed to know nothing of the affair.



WORLD SEARCHED

Police of All Cities Looking for Young Mechanic Who Strangely Disappeared

A worldwide search has been instituted for Albert Bettsworth of Olney, Pa., a young man employed by the Midvale Steel works at that place, who disappeared from the home of his cousin, Herbert Norton, June 2, and has not been heard from since.

Leaving home, presumably to go to his employment, a note was found from Bettsworth later in the day, saying: "I am leaving the city; will write when settled."

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MANY VICTIMS OF
WEIRD PARASITES

Prevalence of Tapeworms in Bay Cities Surprising and Alarming

Huge Creatures Sap Vitality and Make Body Liable to Disease Germs

San Francisco and the bay city residents in surprisingly large numbers are victims of a strange affliction in the form of huge internal parasites, according to a statement of Prof. James M. Munyon, the noted eastern health expert.

"The prevalence of internal parasites, or tapeworms, in the bay cities is marked and alarming. Many persons bring them in daily to my office in San Francisco in the Flannery building, 702 Market street, and also to my Oakland office. These parasites sometimes grow to enormous length. They lodge in the upper part of the bowels at the pit of the stomach and absorb the nutriment of food which the stomach fails to digest. Contrary to general belief, however, these worms are never fatal except that they weaken the body to a point where disease has an easy chance to gain headway."

The symptoms of tapeworm and of stomach trouble are almost identical, and for this reason many a victim of one of these great creatures will doctor for years for stomach trouble without relief, when they could be cured in a few weeks if the cause of their trouble were first known.
