SUFFRAGE CLAUSE IS FOURTH ON SHEETS
Title of Measure is "Senate Amendment No. 8"

OAKLAND, Sept. 7.—Receipt of 2,300 pounds of constitutional amendments from the state printing plant at Sacramento has set at rest the fears of advocates of suffrage for women that senate amendment No. 8 would lose its title on the sheet and so nullify the effect of letters in other literature sent out to identify it to voters.

County Clerk Cook, after inspection of the sheets, reported that senate amendment No. 4 would not prove confusing. It is the fourth to be printed on the sheets.

The work of sending out copies of the amendments is well under way and thousands of envelopes have been addressed to voters. County Clerk Cook will have extra clerks at work on the mailing process with the beginning of next week.

WOMAN OFFICIAL
URGES SUFFRAGE

Political Equality is Discussed by Federated Mothers' Clubs

BERKELEY, Sept. 7.—Nearly 100 women from San Francisco, San Jose, Oakland, Alameda and Berkeley attended the first reciprocity luncheon given at noon today at the Shattuck hotel by the Bay Federation of Mothers' clubs to hear suffrage discussed.

Rev. William Day Simonds, pastor of the First Unitarian church of Oakland, was the first speaker. He was followed by Miss Beatrice McCall, assistant probation officer of Alameda county.

Dr. Simonds cited the experience of New Zealand, Colorado, Wyoming, Utah, Washington and Idaho, where women have a voice in their government, to show that the enfranchisement of the wives and mothers had not been unsuccessful. Not one of those communities, he said, has shown a general disposition to return to former conditions.

Miss McCall discussed the issue from a sociological view, using her experience in probation work to emphasize her statements.

Park Commissioner C. F. Wieland will preside tomorrow night at the first mass meeting arranged by the suffrage promotion committee, which will be held at Masonic temple.

Survivor of Bear Flag Party Among Number
OAKLAND, Sept. 7.—W. M. Mendenhall of Oakland, Mrs. Minerva Harlan of San Ramon and Mrs. Mary Smith of Livermore, three pioneers who crossed the plains before 1843, met recently at the home of Attorney G. W. Langan in this city.

Mendenhall is a native of Michigan and crossed the plains in 1845. He is the sole survivor of that organization. His marriage in 1847 at Santa Clara is believed to have been the first wedding ceremony performed between Americans in this state. The veteran is 83 years of age.
