

PAYOT PROPOSES NEW HIGH SCHOOL

Manual Arts to Be Taught in Place of Preparation for University

Appropriation of \$100,000 Suggested for Building in Bush Street

Following the discovery that only from three to four per cent of the graduates of the existing city high schools enter the University of California or Stanford university...

He suggests that the school be called the Galileo high school of manual arts; that pupils be admitted to it who have completed the sixth grade and that the course consist of the seventh, eighth, ninth and tenth years...

"The urgent necessity for this non-preparatory school must appeal to any one having time enough to give thought to the subject and eyes to see," said Payot yesterday.

UNSOLED BONDS AVAILABLE

"I am asking for an appropriation of about \$100,000 from the bond issue of 1904—unsoled school bonds—to erect the building and to equip it. No land purchase is required, for we have the ideal site at the corner of Bush and Stockton streets, 50 yards remaining to the school department. This amount, or \$120,000 at the outside, will produce the result handsomely."

Los Angeles has a new school of manual arts with an enrollment of more than 2,000. I am told. Our four other high schools in this city can well continue on the program of academic studies in this new school which will occupy a place distinctly its own."

PREPARATION FOR INDUSTRY

Payot's ideas that the academic work taught in this school shall be modified to meet its specific industrial ends rather than to prepare its graduates for entrance to some higher institution of learning. He would have the curriculum include decorative and mechanical drawing, designing and modeling, making simple architectural drawings, sewing, dress making, millinery, home cooking, invalid cooking and care of the sick, care and feeding of children, economical marketing, metal and wood work, and electrical wiring and plumbing and electrical work and such other mental and hand training as may prepare the boy or girl of 16 or 17 to earn a living or complete an apprenticeship. He would have the sessions of the school from 8:30 a. m. until noon and from 1 to 4 p. m., the shops to be open Saturday afternoons.

PROPOSAL IN RESOLUTION

A resolution embodying his ideas was introduced by Payot at the last meeting of the board of education. Following is its text:

Resolved, that the new high school to be established in the northern part of the city known as the Galileo high school of manual arts; that pupils be admitted to it who have completed the sixth grade; that the course consist of the seventh, eighth, ninth and tenth years, with a graduate course when it shall be needed; that the aim of the school be to give the boys and girls an industrial and domestic education to prepare them for the shop and the home; that the academic work taught in this school shall be modified to meet these ends rather than for entrance to some higher institution; that the hand work shall consist of decorative and mechanical drawing, designing and modeling, making and reading of simple architectural drawings; of sewing, dressmaking, millinery, home cooking, invalid cooking and care of the sick; care and feeding of children, and economical marketing; of metal and forge work; of wood work, including plumbing work of the elements of painting and electrical work, and of such other mental and hand training as may be required in the boy and girl at the age of 16 or 17 to earn a living or complete an apprenticeship. And further:

Resolved, that the sessions of this school be from 8:30 to 12 a. m. and from 1 to 4 p. m., and that the shops be open from 8:30 to 12 Saturdays; and that not less than 50 per cent of the work each day be devoted to the manual arts.

YOUNG PEOPLE PLAN COUNTY ASSOCIATION

RED BLUFF, Sept. 14.—Young people representing all the church organizations in Tehama county will meet in this city September 22 for the purpose of organizing a county association of young people's societies. They will also elect delegates to the tri-county convention to be held in Red Bluff in October. Tehama, Butte and Glenn counties will combine in the association.

SAN SALVADOR SAID TO BE RICH IN MINERALS

Industry Is Retarded by Anti-Quoted Methods Used

With the exception of the low lying fringe of coast land, says Consul General Thomas Ewing Dabney of San Salvador, the entire republic of Salvador is rich in minerals, especially in the departments of Santa Ana, in the western region; Chaltenango and Cabanas, in the central region; and Morazan, Union and San Miguel, in the eastern region. The principal foci are at Metapan, in Santa Ana; San Mateo, in Cabanas, and Union and San Miguel, in the departments of the same names.

In Chaltenango and Cabanas the industry, while promising, has not passed far beyond the incipient stage. A wagon road is in course of construction between this region and San Salvador, which, when completed, should develop the district.

Metapan is a famous region, with abundant veins of iron, copper and lead; it is also rich in auriferous silver. The iron and copper invite special attention because of their quality. At present iron is worked in only two places, and by antiquated methods that give scant results. Metapan is connected with Santa Ana, 35 miles, by a good wagon road; from Santa Ana is the railroad to San Salvador and to Acacajula, 48 and 65 miles, respectively. The completion of the railway to Union, San Miguel, Metapan and Zacapa will unite the entire district.

The San Miguel district, however, is richest in mineral deposits. In this region, where attention is devoted mainly to the precious metals, silver is most abundant, though there are also large quantities of gold.

BANK'S ASSETS BRING \$460,450.54

Alden Anderson Pays Cash for Defunct Institution of Shasta County

[Special Dispatch to The Call] REDDING, Sept. 14.—Word has been received here that Bank Superintendent Williams today signed the agreement informally accepted early in the week with Alden Anderson whereby Anderson purchases the assets of the Bank of Shasta county for \$460,450.54 in cash. This makes the contract binding. Williams signed agreement will reach here tomorrow morning.

Anderson also agrees to pay the Anglo and London Paris National bank \$88,000. The settlement is as of September 14. The liabilities of the Bank of Shasta county, as estimated by Williams, were \$728,000. The total sum to be realized from Anderson's offer, together with money on hand, is enough in Anderson's opinion, to pay the depositors dollar for dollar.

Williams is of the opinion that there will be a slight deficiency. Williams will insist on a publication of an advertisement for three or four weeks before the superior court is called upon for its approval.

The sale of the bank building for \$26,000 was confirmed by court after a five days' advertisement.

SACRAMENTO TAXES ARE LOWER THIS YEAR

City and County Levy Will Only Total \$3.09

[Special Dispatch to The Call] SACRAMENTO, Sept. 14.—The county tax rate for the next year will be \$1.70, or 30 cents lower than last year, according to the announcement of County Auditor Williams. The \$1.39 city rate with the \$1.70 county rate will make a total rate of \$3.09, or 51 cents below that of last year. The increase in property valuations brought about the low rate.

The rally committee of the suffrage league is led by Mrs. Aaron Schloss as chairman. She has appointed as ushers for the meeting, who will be directed by Mrs. Samuel Haight, Miss Agnes Slight, Miss Katherine Woodhead, Stewart Bunker, Miss Elsie Barker, Miss Dorothy L. Smith, Miss Ida M. Shrode and Miss Lois Gildred.

The precinct workers of the Berkeley Equal Suffrage league have this week concentrated their efforts in precinct 10, where Lincoln hall is situated, to stimulate interest in the South Berkeley meeting. Mrs. L. E. Blochman is chairman of the precinct committee, directing captains and lieutenants. All report daily to Mrs. Heester Harland, campaign director for the league.

Mrs. Samuel Haight, chairman of the moving picture committee, reported that arrangements had been completed for the display at moving picture houses in Berkeley next week of the suffrage films that have been shown in other bay cities and in interior towns.

ROADS MAY COMBINE TO CONSTRUCT BRANCH

Vallejo-Sacramento Line to Be Joint Affair

[Special Dispatch to The Call] VALLEJO, Sept. 14.—T. C. Gregory, president of the Vallejo and Northern Electric railroad, has notified Mayor W. J. Torney of this city that he will be here next week to confer with the city commission regarding the entrance of his road into the town.

Attorney J. W. Scott arrived this afternoon from Fairfield, where he filed 12 condemnation suits against prominent ranchers in the Jamison canyon district north of this city for the California Terminal Railroad company. It is understood that the company may join with the Vallejo Northern in building the proposed branch from Vallejo to Sacramento. The company intends to tap Napa, Solano and Sacramento counties.

OVER 30 ELECTIONS TO BE HELD THIS WINTER

Voters Throughout State Must Consider Many Projects

SACRAMENTO, Sept. 14.—Exclusive of the state constitutional amendment election on October 19 over 30 district elections are to be held in the state between now and January 1, according to a report being compiled by Secretary of State Jordan.

Of these 11 are local option, 9 on bonds, 4 on annexation and the remainder on municipal matters. Reports show that the local option elections will be held in Orland, San Luis Obispo, Calaveras, Ukiah, Bakersfield, Fresno, San Diego and three supervisory districts in Yreka and Vallejo.

GOVERNOR JOHNSON STARTS SPEAKING TOUR

Will Make Addresses Favoring Proposed Amendments

Francis J. Heney will open the campaign in the northern part of the state in Sacramento Monday night.

SANTA FE TRAIN RUNS DOWN TRACK INSPECTOR

[Special Dispatch to The Call] RIVERSIDE, Cal., Sept. 14.—R. Andras, a track inspector, was run down shortly after 2 o'clock this afternoon and killed by a Santa Fe passenger train near High Grove, five miles east of Riverside.

Andras was riding a railroad velocipede at the time. He failed to hear the whistle until just before the engine struck him.

Andras lived at Colton and was married. He was 36 years old.

Navy Yard News

[Special Dispatch to The Call] MARE ISLAND, Sept. 14.—Chief Gunner Henry McVey, attached to the Bagship California of the Pacific fleet, faced a court-martial board on the Maryland this morning. He pleaded not guilty to the charges of drunkenness and conduct unbecoming an officer in the city as well as a gentleman. Attorney Frank B. Devlin of this city appeared in court for the accused, while Captain J. A. Campbell, U. S. M. C., is judge advocate. Commander John M. Elliott, U. S. N., is senior member of the board. McVey's court-martial was brought about by the suicide of his wife and the bolting apartment house in Vallejo, early last week, and at the time he is said to have been intoxicated. Vallejo policemen at the court-martial house have been subpoenaed to appear before the board.

Naval Constructor Richard Gatewood is confined to his home here under the care of surgeons. The naval officer has been placed in a plaster cast so that bones that were broken as the result of a fall he sustained in Napa county several months ago cast knit properly.

BATTLESHIPS MAY BE SENT OUT HERE

Officials of Mare Island Yard Believe Pacific Fleet Will Be Augmented

[Special Dispatch to The Call] MARE ISLAND, Sept. 14.—The big Atlantic armada may visit the Pacific coast this fall, according to information received here today. The fleet, now in command of Rear Admiral Hugo Osterhaus, former commandant of the Mare Island navy yard, was to have visited Europe again this winter on its annual cruise, but the cholera plague, which has broken out in the Mediterranean has caused the navy department to decide on a different itinerary. No definite action will be taken in the matter, however, until Secretary of the Navy George von Meyer arrives in Washington, D. C., next week from Europe.

The big battleships and cruisers will be ready for a long cruise about October 1. If the armada does visit the Pacific coast, Mare Island officials are of the opinion that several of the cruisers as well as one or more of the battleships will be allowed to remain here. Among the ships which are said to be slated for duty in the Pacific are the cruisers Washington, Tennessee and Montana.

CONSCIENCE STRICKEN THIEF RETURNS LOOT

Apology Is the Only Thing Found Missing
