

GOVERNMENT AID AROUSES UNIONS

Protest of Vallejo Body Will Come Before Local Labor Council Tonight.

A matter that will come up before the San Francisco Labor Council tonight will be the protest of the Trades and Labor Council of Vallejo in relation to advertisements that are published in the east as to the employment of men on the Collier Jupiter, that is to be built at the Mare Island navy yard.

At the last meeting of that body it was stated that advertisements have been placed in eastern papers calling for shipmiths, shipsmiths' helpers, machine riveters, holderson and others, stating that men of these trades will be given jobs at the island navy yard.

It was decided to instruct the council's delegate to the State Federation of Labor at Bakersfield next month to bring the matter up with a view to having it finally taken up at the session of the American Federation of Labor at Atlanta, Ga., next November.

Machinists' lodge No. 68, at its meeting last Wednesday night, received a report from its law and legislative committee in opposition to the Taylor or piece system in machine shops.

Walters' Union No. 30, at its meeting last Wednesday night, elected Alexander Vogel, J. J. O'Brien, J. P. Healy and V. E. Chapman delegates to the San Francisco labor council, vice four delegates who were withdrawn for failure to attend three successive meetings of the council.

Emil Murl, secretary of Brewers' and Malsters' union No. 7 and one of the international officers, returned last Wednesday from a session of the international executive committee held in Cincinnati recently.

Waltresses' union No. 48 on last Wednesday night named Ida Keene as an additional member of the ball committee for the event to be given in the Pavilion rink on the night of October 28.

HOSEMAN STRIKES BLOW WORTH \$252

Man Who Assaulted Captain Escapes With "Mild Punishment" From Commission

Hoseman Thomas Logan was fined \$252-63 days' pay—and sent back to service yesterday by the fire commission "to be given a chance" at the close of his trial for reviling and striking his captain, Frederick Ellenberger.

"I know what it is to be out of a job myself and hunting work," said President Dillon, speaking before the vote to dismiss Logan from the department was taken.

"We hope, young man, you will brace up and win out now we are giving you this chance," he said to Logan after the milder sentence of the loss of two months' pay had been meted out.

The commission assigned William Danahy, Charles Cullon, Robert Wood and W. E. Gallatin to their civil service rank of captain, ending their service as acting battalion chiefs, in accordance with the notice of the civil service board.

Engineer Asks Injunction Engineer Edward O'Malley of the fire department yesterday filed a petition through Attorney James Hanley for the issuance of an injunction against Fire Commissioners James E. Dillon, John Donohue, Eugene Pfaff and L. B. Batchelor, restraining them from appointing 12 firemen from an alleged eligible list to lieutenancies on the grounds that the engineers of the department had been refused permission to take the examinations for promotion.

According to the complaint, the board of fire commissioners and George H. Bahra, Benjamin Rosenthal and Frank C. MacDonald of the civil service commission authorized the holding of a set of examinations among eligible firemen for the position of lieutenant on January 15 last.

When O'Malley appeared at the time set for the holding of the tests he discovered that himself and 10 other engineers were not to be permitted to take the examination for promotion on the score that they were engineers, and not firemen in the true sense of the term.

Burling Charged with Assault Upon Kent Chauffeur Rests Easy Despite Bullet Wound August Burling, the insurance broker who shot and seriously injured William Kent, a chauffeur, in the Union Square hotel early Wednesday morning in a dispute over the payment of a \$10 auto bill, was charged yesterday with assault to commit murder.

In the event of his victim's death, Burling will be charged with murder. Kent rested easy yesterday at St. Mary's hospital, and he has an even chance for recovery.
