

NEW PRISON ABANDONED AFTER BIG EXPENDITURE

New York Governor Declares Site Ill Chosen

ALBANY, N. Y., Sept. 30.—After New York state has spent \$300,000 for site and plans for a new prison to take the place of antiquated Sing Sing, which was built in 1825 and is badly overcrowded, it is proposed to abandon the beginning which has been made at Wingdale, N. Y., and pay the construction company \$125,000 to cancel its \$2,000,000 contract for the erection of the new institution.




