SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 5.—President Taft left Utah tonight assured that the republicans of this state are for him almost to a man, that the people of Utah, regardless of partisan affiliation, are generally in hearty accord with his tariff revision policies and with the promise of Senator Reed Smoot's support in his fight for the ratification of the general arbitration treaties with England and France.

That Utah would send a "Taft first, last and all the time" delegation to the next republican national convention has not been questioned at any time by the most rabid of his ambition mad opponents. There has never been any question about the attitude of the Utah republican organization.

There may have been some doubts builded on the hopes of President Taft's enemies about the unanimity of the Taft sentiment in Utah. Some of the La Follette boomers have endeavored to suggest by innuendo that there was a strong anti-Taft sentiment in this state, but that it could not find concrete expression because "the Mormon church is always with the side that is in power."

Enthusiasm for Cause of Enfranchisement of "Weaker Sex" Rampant

"Woman Suffrage" filled and overflowed Dreamland pavilion with such numerical enthusiasm last night as to remove practically all doubt of San Francisco's attitude on that issue, which on Tuesday next will come before the voters for their decision. The great mass meeting of the campaign of "Votes for Women" was like one of the meetings of the Rolph campaign, with the pavilion filled to its capacity before 8 o'clock and a thousand in the street unable to enter. There was this difference, naturally—that the potential voters were in the majority; but of the 6,000 in the hall several thousand were men, zealous in the cause. "We are on the eve of victory," was the sentiment that opened the meeting.

With an able list of speakers to move the vast audience, enthusiasm for the cause of the enfranchisement of the woman was rampant. Every argument brought against the cause of suffrage was refuted, including the insidious objection that the cause tends toward producing a type of dowdy women, without charm and feminine attractiveness.

MT. SHASTA GIVES UP BODIES OF BOYS

Two Youths Lost on Peak Found by Searchers in Bottom of Deep Canyon

SISSON, Oct. 5.—Nine days' search for Harry Mapes and Herbert Barr, two boys who were lost on the eastern slope of Mount Shasta a week ago last Monday morning in a snowstorm, ended at 11 o'clock this morning when their bodies were found lying close together in the bottom of Mud creek canyon near its head. They were only a mile and a half from camp.

The hundreds who have searched for the pair for over a week hunted down the canyon when they should have gone up. The bodies were found by Matt Kohn, William Kohn and B. Wilson. There were no marks upon them. It is almost certain that the two perished the first night out. Mud creek canyon is a narrow gorge through volcanic ash. The walls are almost vertical, and between 400 and 500 feet high. It was impossible for the boys to climb out, as they could get no foothold in the ashes.

ETHER WAVES LINK U. S. WITH JAPAN

Wireless Operator at Hillcrest Talks to Station in the Orient

Wireless Feats of Hillcrest Station

Previous records made by the United Wireless station at Hillcrest, this city:
Overheard messages between station on Ootchi Island, Japan and Japanese merchant ship in September, 1908. Unable to decipher message.
Spoke to steamship Korea, 3,328 miles off this port on February 7, 1911. Same date spoke to steamship Manchuria, 3,328 miles from port; and steamship Mariposa, 2,995 miles.
On February 10, 1911—Held lengthy conversation with operator on board steamship Korea, 4,492 miles off heads at 3 o'clock a. m. This is the world's record for a message between a ship and land.
October 5, 1911—Operator at Hillcrest held "air talk" with Japanese operator at Jol wireless station on Ootchi Island, northern coast of Japan, 6,000 miles.

Sitting in the operating rooms of the United Wireless telegraph station, in a frame building at Hillcrest near the ocean beach, this city, operator C. H. Kesler suddenly was surprised shortly after 2 o'clock yesterday morning when he heard the faint clicking of a wireless telegraph instrument in the Japanese code.

The message he heard was from a Japanese wireless station called Jol, located off the northern coast of Japan on the island of Ootchi and 6,000 miles distant from this city. Kesler quickly tuned down his instrument and was able to overhear a message being transmitted from the Japanese station to the Chiyo Maru.

From the order of its introduction in the legislature, it has also been known as "senate constitutional amendment No. 8," but on the ballot it is in fourth place—amendment No. 4. A vote for the fourth amendment on the ballot is a vote to enfranchise the women of California, to extend the responsibilities of government to those to whom men now sanguinely give almost full responsibility for the control of their homes; full responsibility for that task of fundamental importance, the rearing of their children.

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ITALY HOISTS ITS FLAG OVER TRIPOLI FORT

Sultania Occupied by Landing Parties While Fleet Anchors in and Near Harbor

Germany and Great Britain Differ In Proposing Basis for Peace Negotiations

LONDON, Oct. 5.—The Italian flag floats over Sultania fort at Tripoli, which was occupied by landing parties. Part of the fleet is anchored in the harbor and the other warships lie a short distance from the dismantled fortifications.

According to a Constantinople report, the Italian warships today bombarded Benghazi and Derna.

Rumors of a naval engagement in Turkish waters, of an attack against Myrtilene and of the blowing up of the Italian battleship Conte di Cavour at Tripoli have not been confirmed from any quarter.

An interesting report is current from Constantinople that while Germany favors the adoption of the Italian ultimatum as the basis of peace negotiations, Great Britain proposes that Tripoli shall become a privileged tributary Turkish vilayet under joint Turkish-Italian administration, thus retaining the suzerainty of the sultan.

ITALIAN SHIPS WATCH COAST AND TURKISH FLEET ENTERS BOSPHORUS

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 5.—Steamers passing through the Dardanelles report that an Italian fleet is cruising off the Turkish coast between the island of Lesbos and the gulf of Enos.

One vessel sighted the fleet off Dedeagatch, 75 miles north of the entrance to the Dardanelles. Another heard heavy firing off the gulf of Saros, perhaps 40 miles from the Dardanelles.

A rumor is current that two large Turkish transports, carrying troops and munitions of war, have been captured at Iefkas.

The sultan has ordered prayers in the mosques, invoking the aid and protection of the prophet against Italy.

The Turkish fleet entered the Bosphorus today from the Dardanelles, so this fleet is beyond reach of the Italian squadrons, having put between it and them the strongly fortified narrow strait of the Dardanelles, 40 miles long, and the sea of Marmora, 160 miles long, and being moored in the strait, on both sides of which Constantinople stands, a narrow body of water, 18 miles long, connecting the sea of Marmora with the Black sea.

TRIPOLITANS ENTHUSIASTIC OVER LANDING OF ITALIAN SOLDIERS

TRIPOLI, Oct. 5.—Some of the inhabitants of Tripoli displayed enthusiasm when they saw the Italians landing from the cruiser Giuseppe Garibaldi.

Advancing Turkish torpedo boats were stranded and badly damaged.

The cables are cut between the land office and the sea and the cable ship has been unable to repair them.

A wireless plant at Derna has been rendered inoperative.

PORTE REPORTS DISASTER TO AN ITALIAN BATTLESHIP AT TRIPOLI

LONDON, Oct. 5.—A dispatch to the Chronicle from Constantinople today says that a cable received there from a Turkish source at Tripoli, via Malta, states that the Italian battleship Conte di Cavour was blown up by a Turkish mine off Tripoli and that the crew and troops aboard the vessel perished.

The dispatch adds:
"A heavy cannonading was heard last night near Samothrace, an island belonging to Turkey, in the Aegean sea, about 20 miles from the coast of Thrace, where flashes from the Italian searchlights were seen.

VIOLENT CANNONADING OFF PREVEZA
"Violent cannonading was also heard off the coast of Preveza. "The newly formed national defense committee today cabled King George of England, asking him to intervene."

A news dispatch from Rome this afternoon says that the delay in the bombardment of Tripoli was due not only to the Italian desire to avoid bloodshed, but also to the fact that the harbor had been extensively mined.

VESSEL IN COURSE OF CONSTRUCTION

The Italian battleship Conte di Cavour, described in a Turkish report as having been blown up by a mine off Tripoli, appears in the naval register as still in the course of construction at Spezia. No vessel of that name is in active service, so far as shown by the records of the Italian navy.

TURKISH DELEGATE TO PEACE UNION ASKS THE PORTE TO ARBITRATE

PARIS, Oct. 5.—Bostani Effendi, the Turkish delegate of the council of the union of the interparliamentary union, acting under the advice of other members of the council, today telegraphed to the porte suggesting that Turkey offer directly to Italy to arbitrate all the differences between the two governments, as both are signatories to The Hague convention.

If Italy refuses, as Bostani Effendi considers probable, she will, he believes, be still further placed in the wrong before the world.
