Address by C. B. Brown Is Feature of Special Program

[Special Dispatch to The Call] FRESNO, Oct. 5.—Five thousand people attended the Fresno county fair today, where the judging of the stock and other exhibits, started yesterday morning, is now in full swing.

In the saddle horse class today but a point and half separated the three ribbon winners. R. L. English of Chico won first with 83 1/2 points, A. D. Davis of Porterville was second with 82 and J. T. Ragsdale of Merced was third with 82 points.

Sanger, Reedley and Dinuba celebrated today at the fair and large delegations attended from all three towns. Mrs. Leota Zapp was awarded a special diploma for her albino mount and a buckskin, both horses having high school gaits. She made the horse perform many tricks, which brought down great applause from the crowd.

The milking contest, in which four herds are competing, has aroused a great deal of interest. A red Friesian cow on Wednesday gave 52 pounds or 6 1/2 gallons of milk. In the butter fat test, for which the premium will be awarded, her milk showed 2.47 or equal to 2.83 pounds of butter.

Mrs. F. K. Wismer of Oregon, whose poultry exhibits have attracted a great deal of interest, took 40 first premiums. Tomorrow has been set aside as Panama-Pacific exposition day. Calvin B. Brown of the exposition board will give a short address during the afternoon. One of the features of the program for the day is a livestock parade, in which all the exhibits in that class will participate. On the tracks there will be two special events. Maurice, a 2 year old colt which Clarence Berry bought in Kentucky last spring for \$12,000, will give an exhibition, while Copo de Oro, a pacing stallion owned by W. G. Durfee of Los Angeles, will pace a mile against time.
