MERIDIAN GAINS \$2,500,000 PLANT

GUNNER BLAMELESS FOR DEATH OF WIFE

Court Martial, Investigating Suicide, Exonerates McEvoy. MARE ISLAND, Oct. 8.—Chief Gunner Henry C. McEvoy, formerly attached to the flagship California, but who was court-martialed last month on the charges of drunkenness and conduct unbecoming a gentleman and an officer, following the suicide of his wife, has been exonerated by the navy department. The court-martial board recommended that McEvoy be acquitted of both charges. McEvoy will assume the ordnance officer's duties of the Maryland tomorrow.

NEW STATE SCHOOL CONTRACT APPROVED

\$8,000 Saved for the Common-wealth on Normal Structure. SACRAMENTO, Oct. 8.—The engineering department of the state has approved the contract for the erection of a new state training school in San Jose. Robert Frist of San Francisco is to do the work for \$52,000. The new school will be an adjunct to the state normal. The legislature appropriated \$60,000, but spirited bidding brought the cost down \$8,000.

S. P. DECIDES TO PAY OFF SHOPMEN

"Discharged Employees" Notified to Report and Receive Wages Due

Federation Leaders Continue Confident of Success and Maintain Pickets

In response to a notification from the railroad company that all discharged employees must report and receive the wages due them, a number of the striking shopmen from the Southern Pacific shops in this city and Oakland will go today and get their money, instead of waiting until October 17, the usual pay day. A state law requires all discharged employees to be paid at once, although the strikers had decided to hold out until the final limit. They do not consider their status that of discharged employees and are purposely delaying drawing their checks in the belief that as long as their names are on the pay roll they remain nominally in the employ of the company.

Sixty Men Imported

PORTLAND, Oct. 8.—Sixty strike breakers were brought to the Harriman shops in this city today. The men arrived here on a train from Seattle, and were shunted into the shop yards from the opposite end of the stockade to where the pickets were on guard. Today otherwise was uneventful. Few strikers congregated in the neighborhood of the shops and there was no opportunity for any disturbance.

Shops Prepared to Resist

OGDEN, Utah, Oct. 8.—That the Southern Pacific shops in Ogden are prepared to withstand a machinists' strike of nine months is the statement of officials of the road. Eighty substitutes arrived in Ogden this afternoon, and after being fed at the company's eating house within the stockade, they continued on west.

Conflict in Statements

CHICAGO, Oct. 8.—Quietness prevails here in the strike of shop workers on the Illinois Central and other Harriman railroads, according to the announcements of railroad officials tonight. They said that the men were becoming dissatisfied with the way the strike was called, and that many of the local unions had demanded that it be ended. Union leaders, however, maintain that the men were satisfied with the progress of the strike and prepared to remain out all winter, if necessary. Vice President W. L. Park of the Illinois Central issued the following statement: "The men are unquestionably dissatisfied with the way the strike was called and its purpose. The leaders attempted to put something over on them and it will not go. The boiler makers in one of the western towns held a meeting Saturday and practically decided to return to work. Some of the machinists' unions are demanding that the strike be called off. The machinists at Paducah have sent a telegram to President James O'Connell, of their international organization, protesting against the strike and declaring they never had an opportunity to vote on the question of becoming members of the system federation. Over 75 per cent of the membership of the local union signed the petition. Train movements continue satisfactory and on the line west of Chicago the strike is not felt at all. According to the dispatch, Valgreen was shot without provocation by a negro while riding on a train. Valgreen leaves a wife and child in this city. MASONS WILL COME ON SPECIAL TRAIN


