

Trace Movement for Air \$20,000 RAISED IN CITY TO AID CHINESE CAUSE

Dispatches Telling of Rebel Victories Are Received With Shouts of Joy Dr. Sun, Slated to Be President of Proposed Republic, Was Recently Here

China, aflame with revolt in Hupoh and Honan and threatened with an uprising in seditious Chihli province, inspired the agents of the Young China society in San Francisco yesterday to warlike enthusiasm, with a result that \$20,000 was sent to Hankow last night to aid the newly proclaimed republic.

Bulletin after bulletin in front of the office of the Chinese Daily World, was posted during the afternoon, showing the progress of the revolution.

A dispatch from Hankow, dated October 12, sent by the Chinese correspondent of the local daily, stated:

HANKOW IS BURNING "Hankow on fire. Foreign nations dispatching eight warships to Hankow to protect foreigners."

Although dated October 12, the cablegram, owing to the difference in time, referred to yesterday's developments.

Hundreds of Chinese pushed and jostled at the bulletin board to read the war news. Every spectator apparently was a revolutionary sympathizer.

Another dispatch, dated Peking, Oct. 12, 3:40 p. m., read:

Minister of War Yin Ch'ang ordered to send 20,000 picked Manchou troops from Peking to the disaffected provinces.

These troops are the flower of the modern Chinese army. Prince Yuan Shih Kai, father of the new army, who has been under an official cloud, petitioned the minister of war to be allowed to lead the royal forces.

PALACE GUARD INCREASED At Peking an official edict ordered the guard of Chihli province to send to Peking his most trusted Manchou to protect the palace, the city and the foreign compounds from attack. This shows the straits of the government, as recent reports from Chihli indicated that revolt was likely to break out there.

That the general of Hupoh, Chung Hiao, recently reported killed by still alive but severely wounded, was stated in a cablegram from Hankow declaring that the Taotai of Hankow had fled before the rebel force.

The \$20,000 sent to China represented hard earned coins. Servants, porters, truck gardeners and all of the humble class of coolies sent their nickels and dimes to swell a fund that has been accumulated since the death of the Emperor Kwangsu and the Dowager Empress Tshan.

MORE FUNDS SOUGHT The agents of the Young China society promise a money fund will be raised by local merchants.

These merchants will pay their money anonymously, fearing that their relatives and business associations in the Flowery Kingdom would suffer the far-reaching wrath of the Manchu officials.

Young China agents are working to collect funds in every city in America. In addition to the money raised by the Sun Yat Sen Ho Shih, as the society is known, leaflets of revolutionary trend have been prepared for distribution in the Chinese army and navy.

Report was received from anti-foreign demonstrations literature was placed aboard the Chinese cruiser Hai Chi and that the officers of that vessel had forbidden the sailors to read it. The society claims that a number of desertions followed the action of its agents.

That the Chinese Empire Reform society, the greatest revolutionary body outside China, may be drawn into the rebellion, although at present quiescent, was the prediction of a leading Chinese editor here. A cable was received that King Yui Wei, leader of the organization, had disappeared mysteriously from Hankow. If it should prove that he has been killed the society may aid the rebel cause.

REPORT IS UNCONFIRMED A dispatch that a son of Dr. Sun Yat Sen was elected leader of the revolutionary society in Honan was not confirmed by the native correspondents.

That the revolt may change from an anti-Manchu to a general anti-foreign demonstration is feared by local Chinese, who are preparing to petition the Chinese minister at Washington to ask the United States government to warn missionaries in China to remain neutral.

Should later advices prove that Hankow has fallen the rebel success in America and now is at Chihli, both sides of the Yangtze river, as Wuchang is flaunting the revolutionary banners. Szechuen province, hotbed of a general revolt, is also reported as probable fuel for the insurrectionary flames.

FATHER OF MOVEMENT The activity of Chinese in America was fostered by Dr. Sun Yat Sen, leader of the Young China society and veteran of the revolution. His death resulted in his banishment with a price upon his head. Doctor Sun for nearly a year spread the revolutionary propaganda in America and now is at Chihli appealing for funds.

A year ago at Honolulu Doctor Sun was arrested at the instance of Chinese officials, but a federal judge held that the arrest was for political purposes and ordered his release. Later, in London, the leader was kidnapped by emissaries of the emperor. The British foreign office, however, refused to threaten reprisals unless the prisoner were released at once.

Doctor Sun was accompanied on his tour by W. S. Wong, who had a narrow escape from losing his head after the Boxer uprising.

APPEAL IS ISSUED Recently Doctor Sun appealed to the Chinese of America and to those interested in the modernization of the empire in the following words:

"The educated class of Chinese are tiring of the rule of the Manchu dynasty and a number of lecturers have been sent throughout the United States to enlighten the Chinese with present conditions.

"The people are anxious for a reform government, that they may secure education and forge to the front. As it is now, China is being sliced up and her territory is going to other nations. Japan has secured a large slice and it will not be long until other nations lend a helping hand.

"The present ruler of China is not a native of China. He is Manchurian and follows a policy of oppression, which has passed into the hands of

CAR SERVICE TO PARK HOW TO REACH STADIUM

Car service adequate for the handling of 20,000 persons an hour in either direction has been arranged by the United Railroads company, and a schedule has been printed showing residents of all parts of the city the shortest and quickest means of reaching the stadium in Golden Gate park in time to attend the ground breaking ceremonies.

The following lines of cars will run directly to the stadium:

Line No. 5, the McAllister street line—From the ferry via Market, McAllister and Fulton streets.

During the time when this route is broken by procession the cars will be routed as follows:

Ferry via Market, Eddy, Devisadero, McAllister and Fulton streets to the stadium, returning regular route after passage of parade.

Line No. 2, Sutter and Clement streets line—From Sansome and Market streets via Sutter, Presidio avenue, Parker avenue, Euclid avenue, Clement street, Eighth avenue and Fulton street to stadium.

Line No. 23—From Richmond avenue and Mission street via Mission, Valencia, Gough, McAllister and Fulton streets to stadium.

Will be diverted during parade out Haight and H streets to the stadium.

Line No. 6, Hayes street line—From ferry via Market, Hayes, Fillmore, Oak and H streets to stadium.

Line No. 7, Haight street line—From ferry via Market, Haight and H streets to stadium.

Line No. 20, Ellis street and Ocean line—From Market and Fourth streets, via Ellis, O'Farrell, Devisadero, Oak and H streets to stadium.

During passage of procession this line will be looped between Devisadero and Fourth and Market streets on lower end and between stadium and Hayes and Devisadero on outer end.

Line No. 24, the Mission and Richmond line, will be routed as follows: Cortland avenue and Folsom street via Mission, Sixteenth, Fillmore, Oak and H streets to stadium.

SCHOOL BOARD'S FIRE IS AROUSED BY PEDAGOGUES

Supervisors' Letter Asking Care in Appointments Called Attack on Body

The session of the board of education yesterday morning was marked by spirited discussion of three subjects. One was the proposed revocation of the certificates granted to five teachers, another the proposed dismissal of a teacher who was granted a leave of absence for a year on the ground of illness, and the third a letter from supervisors in the department, which one of the directors construed into an implication that the board is not making appointments on the ground of fitness.

The subject that started the discussion was a resolution that the certificates granted to five teachers in special subject be revoked because in compliance with the board's order the certificates had been awarded, an error had been made.

Before any action was taken, Director Power charged that Miss Ellen M. Bartlett, supervisor of domestic science, had given five classes a week to one of the teachers in question, and none to another. He declared that the board was prejudiced on the part of Miss Bartlett toward San Francisco teachers and that she had stated that special teachers should be graduates in the east.

EXPLANATION OFFERED Superintendent Roncovieri said that Miss Bartlett had told him that only teachers who have graduated in the east should be appointed.

The discussion closed with the understanding that the five teachers will undergo another examination and the certificates were revoked.

A resolution to the effect that Isabel Moore, a teacher in the girls' high school, "having obtained a leave of absence under false representation, be dismissed from the department."

When it was reported a few weeks ago that Miss Moore was teaching in Oakland she was notified to appear before the board and explain her action. Instead of appearing her brother came with a note from a doctor certifying that Miss Moore was still suffering from a nervous ailment and needed rest.

ACTION IS POSTPONED There being objection to the wording of the resolution, it was decided to lay the matter over until the next meeting, when Moore to appear before the board on Monday and explain her action.

A letter signed by Kathrine M. Ball, supervisor of drawing, Le-w Ball, superintendent of primary reading, F. K. Bartlett, superintendent of manual training, Estelle Carpenter, supervisor of music, and Ellen M. Bartlett, supervisor of the various educational subjects, in accordance with the popular demand for the betterment of the public schools, in the various branches of the school system, the board of education, the supervisors of special subjects, respectively to the board of education, the supervisors of the special branches a preference be given to those who qualify both by a knowledge of the particular subject and acquainted with the latest educational methods of teaching the same to public school children. Realizing the constantly changing industrial and economic conditions of our people, we feel the necessity, not only for ourselves, but for the coming teachers who will be our colleagues.

POWER ASKS QUESTION Director Power wanted to know "who had asked these subordinate to send him a letter to the board?" He was informed that the letter was left in the office.

"It means by implication," said Power, "that he is not acquainted with the letter. I think that with the prejudice shown by one of the signers and an apparent determination to create trouble, we have a right to know what or who inspired this letter. The letter seeks to convey the impression that at least two members of this board do not know what to do."

A motion to ask for an explanation came from the board, and Director Kincaid voting in the negative.

Director Kincaid said, after this action had been taken, that letters from citizens and who want to inquire into their motives, she added, "When other citizens present letters, you" and the speaker looked directly at Director Power. "Don't ask their motives; you do it."

Superintendent Roncovieri said that while the letter was respectful, by implication it cast a reflection on the members of the board.
