ADD OF IMPROVEMENTS PLEDGED TO CITY

Congressman Expresses Deep Surprise Over Extent of Harbor Work

OAKLAND, Nov. 17.—"I have been greatly impressed with my trip along the water front," said Congressman William E. Humphrey of Washington state, a member of the rivers and harbors committee of the house of representatives and the only representative on that committee west of the Rocky mountains, today.

"It is our rule as committee members to express no opinion. But I will say that I have been converted and I stand willing to do anything honorable for Oakland."

Congressman Humphrey spent the morning inspecting the improvements under way in the Oakland harbor and along the water front and in the afternoon was taken on an automobile tour of the city. The party was taken aboard the government tug Golden Gate at Washington street wharf, San Francisco, at 10 o'clock this morning.

After leaving the wharf the tug went slowly up the estuary to the wharf of the E. K. Wood Lumber company, East Oakland. The western congressman was shown the permit features of the inside harbor and its improvements, and the wishes of Alameda were explained.

Outside of the loss of the congressman's hat overboard while inspecting the Key Route basin the only incident of the cruise occurred when the tug ran into the pier of the Wood Lumber company and tore several piles away. The accident was due to the shallow water.

After returning to Franklin street wharf the party was conveyed to the Forum cafe, where lunch was served. H. C. Capwell was toastmaster and introduced Mayor Mott, who said:

"Mr. Humphrey pleased me today with many kind expressions in regard to what we are doing in Oakland. We need aid and want a substantial sum appropriated for the completion of the entire water front project. Oakland wants it authorized this year. With all we are doing ourselves we feel that congress should give this much assistance. Our water front project affects all California, Oregon and Washington and even the state of Nevada, which finds its outlet in our proposed inland harbor. It is a federal question and we want federal aid."

Congressman Humphrey was followed by Congressman Joseph R. Knowland, who said, in part: "I will introduce a bill to exempt American shipping through the canal from tolls. I do not know whether it will pass or not, but it should receive due consideration. Foreign seamen receive smaller pay than American seamen and crew, and for that reason we must give our own shippers some advantages in the canal shipping to put them on an even basis of competition with foreign shippers."

QUAY WALL VIEWED After the luncheon Humphrey was taken to the foot of Myrtle street, where he inspected the work on the new quay wall, and thence to the foot of Wood street to view from the land side the municipal dock site between the Southern Pacific and Western Pacific piers.

BOYS' CREMATION IN LAUNCH FEARED

Burning of Craft Connected With Disappearance of Oakland Youths

OAKLAND, Nov. 17.—The police were asked today to investigate the disappearance of John Gomez and Tony Silva, 1655 Ninth street, who are believed to have been lost in a launch which was destroyed by fire in San Pablo bay last Tuesday night. The young men, both 20 years old, left Oakland two weeks ago in a small gasoline launch on a hunting and fishing trip to Bourdin island and were expected home a week ago. The burning launch was seen by the skipper of the river boat Constance, who put out the flames with hose, but was unable to save the hulk from sinking. The parents of the boys received word that they would start for home last Friday, and if they followed out these plans it is probable that they would have been in San Pablo bay at the time the burning craft was sighted. Captain of Inspectors Petersen will attempt to get some trace of the missing youths.

DIVORCE SEPARATES COUPLE A YEAR ONLY


Cupid Scores Another Triumph Over Court Decree

WILSON WOULD SET CITY TO FIGURING

Mayor Recommends That Municipal Plants Throughout Country Be Investigated

BERKELEY, Nov. 17.—Mayor J. Stitt Wilson transmitted to the city council this morning a message recommending that the administration begin at once the collection of statistics with a view toward eventual municipal ownership of public utilities, and that a civic art commission be constituted. Other recommendations dealt with finance and with proposed charter amendments.

In the matter of municipal ownership, he asserts that the bureau of municipal research about to be created at the University of California will be of service in obtaining data.

The message continues: "DEFINITE POLICY NEEDED"

"I am more than ever convinced that the city of Berkeley and her sister cities should take a definite and constructive policy looking toward the establishment of municipal ownership of electric lighting and power plants, and lay plans toward such state legislation as will open up the vast sources of power in the Sierra for the use of the people at the lowest possible cost. I would recommend to the council that we proceed to make a thorough study of the whole question. We should have detailed statements of the cost of various municipal plants throughout the country; of the cost of operation, and the rates paid for light and power; and the net profits such plants yield to the cities."

HUSBAND BEGS TO KEEP WIFE'S BODY

Says She Is Not Dead, but Sleeping; Threatens Suicide if Remains Are Removed

OAKLAND, Nov. 17.—Pleading that his aged wife was not dead, but sleeping, Nils Anderson, 1740 Ninety-second avenue, threatened to commit suicide when a deputy coroner went to the home today to remove the body of Mrs. Caroline Anderson, who died this morning of cancer.

Anderson, who is 70 years old, refused to let Deputy Coroner Murphy take the body away and Murphy called in Patrolman Enright of the Melrose station for assistance.

When Murphy and Enright entered the room where the dead woman lay Anderson begged them to leave the body with him.

"My wife is not dead, gentlemen," he said. "She is asleep and will wake soon. Please leave her with me."

When it was explained that this could not be done the old man pulled two vials from a coat pocket, one containing chloroform and the other arsenic, and threatened to kill himself if the men did not leave the house. He finally was persuaded to go to the home of a friend, Mrs. R. England, 725 Burling street, where he is being cared for, and the body was taken to the morgue.

Mrs. Anderson had been ailing for some time and her husband took tender care of her. They had been married nearly 50 years and were a devoted couple. Anderson said he had hoped they would both die about the same time.

Anderson and his wife had lived in the home for many years.

CONSCIENCE PROMPTS THIEF TO SURRENDER

Theft From Salvation Army Captain Troubles Him
