

EYES OF THE EAST ARE TURNED WEST

Colonel Loveland, Back From Commercial Congress, Is Optimistic for Fair

"Safe to Predict That 1915 Session Will Be Held in San Francisco," He Says

Bubbling over with enthusiasm for the future prosperity of this city, Colonel H. D. Loveland, railroad commissioner for this state, has returned from the Trans-Mississippi commercial congress at Kansas City, where he was sent as special representative by Governor Johnson. According to Loveland the entire country is active with interest in San Francisco and the coming Panama-Pacific international exposition. Besides being special representative of this city, Colonel Loveland acted as a delegate of the Chamber of Commerce, the California development board and the San Francisco Convention league.

Many interesting and important subjects were taken up at the Trans-Mississippi congress, among which were currency legislation, the rebating of Panama canal tolls for American ships and a national health board. Among those who spoke were Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson, who outlined the policy that he believed this government should follow regarding canal tolls, Nelson W. Aldrich, chairman of the monetary committee of the senate; Champ Clark, speaker of the house of representatives, and Governor Harmon.

ADDRESS ON EXPOSITION

Colonel Loveland spoke on "The Importance of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition." His address was made before more than 6,000 persons and was enthusiastically received. He advocated the holding of the twenty-first annual session of the congress in this city, which will be in 1915.

"It is safe to predict at this early date," declared Colonel Loveland yesterday, "that the twenty-sixth session of the Trans-Mississippi congress will be held in this city. It is an assured fact."

"Besides attending the congress I traveled through most of the large cities of the east and west as far as New York. I was astonished to see the amount of interest displayed by the average citizen in the conditions of California and wherever I went I was asked questions regarding this city."

CAPITAL COMING WEST

"From my observations I would say that there will be a tremendous influx of easterners with capital to this city and state long before the completion of our world's fair. I know for a fact that people east of the Rockies are planning right now to come west to settle and make investments."

"I happened to be in one of the large cities when they had a blizzard. I was sitting in the lobby of a hotel, when another guest who was a stranger to me came over and, addressing me, said: 'I see by the register that you are from San Francisco, and being interested in your city, I thought I would take the liberty of asking you some questions,' which he did, and this was not the only case of where people displayed their interest in this city. Among the other delegates who returned with Colonel Loveland were G. B. Daniels of Oakland and Fred P. Howard of this city. Both were hustlers in boosting this city throughout the east."


