





BIG RACING MEET STARTS AT JUAREZ

Crack Thoroughbreds Ready to Face the Barrier in Opening Card Today

JUAREZ, Nov. 29.—With ideal weather conditions and a fast track promised, the third season of winter racing will be ushered in at Terrazas park tomorrow. Everything is ready to accommodate the vast crowd which is expected at the opening.

More than 600 horses are quartered at the track, and they include some of the best thoroughbreds that raced in America last season. With an opening ring, probably 15 bookmakers will cut in for the opening day.

Monday will open off day until Christmas, after which racing will be held every day in the week.

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—Main Sheet, a 12 year old black stallion by Director General-Pixell, today fetched the largest sum yet realized for a single animal in this year's Old Glory horse sale. He was consigned by Al Thomas of St. Joseph, Mo., and Cobb Brothers of Wellsville, N. Y., for the purpose of dissolving a joint partnership in him. The Cobbs bid him in for \$15,000.

He was bought by Stainer & Brothers of Lima, O., for \$3,800. Of Ed Custer's family, Orphant Annie, a 2 and a half year old filly, brought the highest price, going to B. O. Shank of North Randall, O., for \$1,600.

The average price paid for the Custer stock was \$900 a head.

Billings Will Take Stable To Russia

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—It is announced here that C. K. G. Billings, the millionaire horseman, expects to leave this country next year for an extended residence in Russia, taking with him the pick of his string of trotters, including Uhlau, 1:55, which became the champion trotter of the world at Cleveland last summer. Billings already has shown Lou Dillon in Russia, where the millionaire has aroused the greatest enthusiasm.

It is said that Billings intends establishing a breeding farm in Russia and will enter his trotters at all the local race meetings. He will leave the country early in January.

Russia has bred famous trotting horses for many years, and breeders there receive imperial support. The Russians, however, never have succeeded in producing animals of the speed of the greatest American trotters, although many American sires have been imported into the country and crossed with the Orloff and other noted strains.
