"Full Ahead" Will Be First Signal When New Mayor Takes Bridge

Able Seamen Will Be on Watch Against Dangerous Shoals

When the new board of supervisors is called to order Monday for its initial session San Francisco will have its first illustration of the business principles which are to be applied to municipal affairs in the next four years.

For two months Mayor elect James Rolph Jr. and the members of the incoming board of supervisors have been wrestling with the preliminaries of several of the most vital problems which the city has to face, and when the new administration comes into power it will be prepared to start the machinery going without spending a penny of the valuable time which is being made to make the wheels go round.

To provide for the presence of as many as possible of those who wish to witness the beginning of the new year of things, the first meeting of the supervisors will be held in a public chamber larger than the present makeshift board room at 64 Eddy street.

Arrangements for the inauguration of the new administration are being made in a public hall which may be available.

WILL FOLLOW LETTER OF LAW

Rolph spent most of yesterday working over his message and making a last study of the appointments which he is to make immediately upon taking office.

His consideration of appointments has been in the light of the charter provisions requiring representatives of each political party on several of the commissions, and the appointments to be made Monday to fill vacancies in these commissions will all be in line with the letter of the law.

Thus far Rolph has made no appointments, but he has taken the stand that his power to appoint will not exist until after midnight next Sunday.

He has made all, or nearly all, of his appointments to the commissions to be made Monday, but that the formal offers of these appointments to those whom he expects to invite into his official family will not be made until the following day.

He will offer the appointments to those whom he has chosen within the next few days, but the public will not be taken into his confidence in this matter until he takes office.

Rolph's message promises to be a record breaker for brevity and directness. It will not exceed 2,000 words, but will deal in a positive manner with a score of important policies of administration. It will outline Rolph's views on the purchase of Spring Valley, the building of a city hall, the Geary street road and many general matters of public interest. It will call for immediate action by the board of supervisors on a dozen or more matters of importance.

MEETINGS TO BE HELD

In the remaining days of this week several meetings are to be held by the incoming supervisors alone and jointly with the expiring architects on the civic center matter.

Following the formalities attending the induction of Rolph and his assistants into office, the latter will at once organize by appointing the committees selected several weeks ago and will name its clerk and other assistants.

Before the meeting adjourns various resolutions will be presented and acted upon as a basis for obtaining immediate results in connection with the matters that are being discussed.

In addition to the naming of his personal office staff and one supervisor to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Supervisor elect James B. Bocardo, Rolph will have 14 other appointments at his disposal Monday as a result of vacancies existing through the expiration of terms, and may have others should certain expected resignations be forthcoming.

For his own office, Rolph will have the appointment of a private secretary, a stenographer and an usher, and also will request the chief of police to assign some policeman whom he wishes assigned as messenger with the rank of detective sergeant.

At least two will be among Rolph's first list of appointees, as he will have five playground commissioners to name and the charter provides that two of these shall be women.

He also will have the naming of two election commissioners, one of whom will be a democrat and the other a socialist. The other commission vacancies that will exist Monday will be for two park commissioners, one police commissioner, one fire commissioner, one member of the board of education, one member of the board of public works and one civil service commissioner.

SATHER WILL IN PROBATE, TALK OF CONTEST BEGINS

Coming of Heirs From East Revives Rumors

OAKLAND, Jan. 2.—The will of the late Mrs. Jane Krom Sather was admitted to probate by Superior Judge Brown today. The California Title Insurance and Trust company was appointed administrator of the estate, as provided in the will.

Mrs. S. Sather was the widow of the late Peder Sather, who has resided in the east for many years, and she has a family of five children, a son of Mrs. Maryon Andrews Bruguliere, and a son of Mrs. E. A. Bruguliere, who arrived from the east without each other's knowledge, started rumors that the will would be contested.

Mr. S. Sather was left only the old family homestead as her share of the estate, and of this she has assumed possession. Friends of the Brujulieres have said that Mrs. Sather inherited the estate of her husband at his death, and that in passing it in bulk to the university she has practically diverted the inheritance to her children.

It is on this point that a possible contest of the will would hinge.
