STANFORD STARS BACK IN HARNESS

Cardinal Supporters Look Forward to a Winning Track Team This Spring

[Special Dispatch to The Call] STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Jan. 11.—The chances for a winning track team were considerably increased today, when Alderman and Boulware were taken off probation by the scholarship committee. Both athletes were the victims of clerical errors in the registrar's department and should not have been placed on probation at all.

If Alderman can come up to the form he showed last fall he should have little difficulty in clearing the hammer throw in the intercollegiate meet with Berkeley. At that time he hurled the hammer 160 feet. Boulware is a pole vaulter with a record of more than 11 feet. He did not place in the meet last year, but another season's practice should dislodge the nervousness of last year.

The failure of some of the most promising track men to register and the ineligibility of others puts upon "Dad" Moulton an extremely difficult task in developing a winning track team. In almost every event new men must be found.

Alderman should take her share of the points in the sprints, with Captain T. L. Coleman and McKee as the mainstays. Coleman was the winner of the 220 and 100 yard dashes in the 1910 and 1909 meets and McKee won the 220 last year and took third in the shorter event. Campbell, the best all around cardinal athlete, can be relied upon in the dashes, but he will be called upon to take points from the speedy Berkeley hurdlers.
