COMPANY TO BE SUED FOR CAPTAIN'S FINE

Stratton Will Begin Action Against Pacific Mail

Collector of the Port Stratton has been instructed by the treasury department to begin actions at law against the Pacific Mail Steamship company and the steamship Korea, belonging to that company, to recover the fine of \$200 imposed upon the late Captain J. W. Saunders of the Korea, for having permitted contraband opium to be brought to this country on the steamer. Saunders was originally fined \$3,429, but this was subsequently reduced to \$200, when it was shown that Saunders had exercised what seemed to be ordinary caution to prevent the importation of the opium.

REED TIES HANDS OF WORKS BOARD

Employment of "Experienced" Clerks in Jobs Enjoined as Being Irregular

The board of works was restrained yesterday by an order of the superior court secured by Charles Wesley Reed from placing any of the 34 "experienced clerks" in jobs who were qualified by the recent civil service examination. Of nearly 400 applicants for this test only 34 finally passed, and all but 14 of these just "scraped through" by the civil service board reducing the passing grade from 75 per cent to 70 per cent after looking over the papers. Reed, besides alleging this irregularity, held that the list of "ordinary clerks," of whom the board had 159 in reserve, should have been drawn upon to fill the 23 positions, and that the examination for "experienced clerks" was in itself, as well as in its manner, an imposition.
