CLARK SUCCEEDED BY DR. C. A. WILLS

Supervisor Dictates Appointment of Alameda County Infirmiry Superintendent

Physician Awarded Office Has Excellent Record in Washington Township

OAKLAND, Feb. 1.—Dr. C. A. Wills of Centerville was appointed superintendent of the county infirmiry by the board of supervisors today.

The action was regarded as the acknowledgement of the strategic position held by Supervisor Daniel J. Murphy of Livermore, who presented Dr. Wills' name.

The suggestion by the Alameda Tax association that the head of the county infirmiry be required to drop his private surgical practice and devote all his time to his official duties led to the resignation of Dr. Clark.

Dr. Wills is a graduate of the University of California and the Allied Colleges with the class of 1903. Later he was house officer for Mount Zion hospital at San Francisco, and for several years he has been building up a practice about Centerville and points in Washington township.

WATER COMPANY'S RECEIPTS ARE BIG BY HIS OWN HAND

EMBEZZLER DIES Fearing Prosecution, N. George Johnson, Oakland Laundry Collector, Commits Suicide

OAKLAND, Feb. 1.—The annual report of the People's Water company for the year 1911 was filed with the city council today and shows a large volume of business, the gross receipts collected by him since his appointment to the position of municipal collector amounting to \$1,097,237.06.

The report will be turned over to City Expert J. H. Dockweller, who will compare it with the data and statistics collected by him since his appointment by the former city council for the purpose of gathering information upon which to place a value on the holdings of the company with the view of its becoming a municipal plant.

Dockweller's findings will be presented to the city council and this body will then begin taking testimony and gathering data upon which to fix the water rates for the ensuing year.

The report filed today shows that expenses for the year amounted to \$432,368.92, leaving a balance for 1912 of \$664,868.14. Structural depreciation of the plant is placed at \$188,979, leaving a net balance of \$475,889.14.
