ler intimidated tonight that the federal grand jury which returned the indictments might be recalled to resume investigation of the conspiracy.

More Indictments Likely

"After the defendants are arraigned on March 12 and the trials proceed," said Miller, "we have reason to anticipate new aspects. Information is expected to develop at the trials indicating the complexity of many more than those indicted now. We do not assert that we already have all those implicated. This is, however, a beginning."

The indictment on which the men were arrested was made public tonight. It charges all 54 men with conspiracy to violate the statutes forbidding the carrying of explosives on passenger trains and details 47 transactions charged as overt acts and names Ortle E. McManigal, the McNamaras or Herbert S. Hockin in each act, but does not specify the part taken by the other defendants.

Defendants Named in All

All the defendants are named in each of the 32 indictments, and, according to District Attorney Miller, sentences may be imposed for each of the offenses. It is the contention of the government that each of the defendants was fully in each of the conspiracy cases, although his active participation may have been in one transportation only. There are 14 indictments charging over acts and 14 charging unaccompanied acts of conspiracy. Another indictment of 34 counts charges all the defendants as being principals in the transportation of nitroglycerine.

A further indictment of 34 counts charges McManigal and J. B. McNamara with physical transportation of nitroglycerine and all the other defendants with abetting. The other remaining indictments with 16 counts each charge all the defendants as being principals in transportation of dynamite and with having aided McManigal and J. B. McNamara.

CONTAIN 128 COUNTS

Altogether the indictments contain 128 counts against each of the defendants and the penalty for any one of the offenses varies from 18 months to two years.

Sixty-five of the explosions considered in the indictments were on work of members of the National Erectors' association, an organization of "open shop" employers, and 31 explosions or attempts were on work of contractors who were not members of the Erectors' association.

Only two of the indicted members of the national executive board of the Iron Workers' association have been arrested tonight. They are P. J. Cooley of New Orleans, who was reported to be returning to New Orleans, and Michael J. Young of Boston.

MEANIGAL STILL WITNESS

Young is alleged to have assisted McManigal in explosions at Springfield, Mass. Previous to the blowing up of section of the Boston opera house, March 27, 1908, McManigal said it was arranged for him to go to Boston and see Young. Arriving at Boston, he said, Young took him about the opera house, in course of construction, and showed him where to cause the explosion.

Young also was associated with McManigal in an explosion at Springfield, Mass., April 1, 1911, according to the latter's confession.

"I met Young in Boston and we went to Springfield together," said McManigal. J. J. McNamara had told me to go to Boston and get in touch with Young. He said he did not know whether Young wanted me to meet a superintendent or to go to a job, but he said I was to go prepared to do a job and not to meet anybody, meaning I was not to do any slugging.

CARPENTER ORGANIZER HELD

Hiram Cline, national organizer for the International Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners, was arrested at his home at Muncie late today and brought here tonight. Cline is the third agent of any union except the iron workers to be involved in the conspiracy. The others are Clarence E. Dowd of Rochester, N. Y., former agent of the International Machinists' union, and Spurgeon F. Meadows of Indianapolis, an agent of the carpenters' union. All it is alleged, were concerned in dynamiting depredations against contractors who employed nonunion carpenters and machinists.

GOVERNMENT SOON MAY DESTROY ROCK MENACE

Report Will Be Submitted to Washington

VALLEJO, Feb. 14.—It was announced this afternoon that the public works department of the Mare Island navy yard is making soundings in the vicinity of Commission rock in about 10 days, with a view to submitting a report to the navy department as to the probable cost of blasting out the rock, as has so frequently been recommended. The total amount now available for the continuation of all work on the dike system and other improvements of the Mare Island channel is \$300,000, with a limit of cost of \$502,000 placed upon the work, such addition to be provided for by special appropriation of congress in the event of its being deemed necessary.

AEROGRAM SENT IN MIDAIR BY AVIATOR

Horace Kearney Demonstrates Practicability of Wireless on Aeroplane

OAKLAND, Feb. 14.—The first tests of wireless telegraphy from an aeroplane ever made in northern California were conducted at the aviation grounds this afternoon, Horace Kearney acting as the aerial telegrapher and Archie McDonald and Leo Scott, two Oakland high school boys, handling the ground instruments.

Kearney is an expert operator, and with his complete sending outfit attached to his machine ascended to a height of 300 feet.

"Do you get me? This is a beautiful view up here. That ditch on the infield looks like a grand canyon from where I sit," was the message he ticked off in the Morse code.

Most admirably caught every dot and dash, and believe that Kearney can send receivable messages from a height of two miles in the sky. This is the distance he will ascend in his test Saturday, the opening day of the meet.

Farnum Fish, the 17 year old high school lad, who is to take two boy and girl scholars for passenger flights Saturday and Sunday, tried out his Wright biplane this afternoon. A young woman accompanied him on the flight.

William Hoff, the San Francisco aviator, has requested Chairman Leavitt to assign him to the task of delivering an aerial message to the mayor of San Jose, while Weldon B. Cooke is anxious to make the Sacramento trip.

The flight of Glenn Martin from Oakland to San Francisco, carrying an invitation from Mayor Mott to Mayor Rolph to attend the aviation meet, has been postponed until Saturday morning. It was Martin's desire to land in Van Ness avenue, one block from the city center. A permit to make the hazardous landing was denied the aviator, and it will be necessary for the "aerial messenger" to land and ascend from the Presidio. Martin will be the guest of the army officers at an early luncheon Saturday, and after delivering the officers, as well as Mayor Rolph, the invitation will fly back to the aviation field in Oakland.

PARENTS OF A CHILD PERFORMER ARE FINED

Theater Manager Arrested and Released on Bail

Stroud, vaudeville actors, were arrested for allowing their four year old child, Violet, to sing and dance on the stage. Constable Davis, District Attorney Magdoux and Justice Jennings witnessed the performance and at the close the child's parents and the manager of the theater were arrested and taken before the police court which was convened at 10:30 p. m.

It developed that the child practically supported her parents. They entered a plea of guilty, and were fined \$25 each. The theater manager was released on bail.



"GOLDEN RULE" ARIZONA POLICY FOR GOV. HUNT

Simple Ceremonies Mark Inauguration of First Elected Executive of State

Thousands Attend Ball in Public Streets of Phoenix at Night

PHOENIX, Ariz., Feb. 14.—At noon today on the balcony of the state capitol, in the presence of 15,000 persons, George W. P. Hunt of Globe took the oath of office as first governor of the state of Arizona. The oath was administered by Chief Justice Alfred Franklin of the state supreme court, who had been sworn in only a few moments earlier.

Word had come by telegraph from the national capital that President Taft had signed the proclamation admitting Arizona, the last of the territories on contiguous soil and the forty-eighth state of the union.

The ceremonies attendant upon the birth of the state and the induction into office of its first executive were entirely devoid of the pomp and display that usually accompany inaugurations.

HUNT WALKS TO CAPITOL

Accompanied by a number of the newly elected state officers and a few close friends, Governor Hunt, who began life in Arizona a quarter of a century ago as a waiter in a small mining camp restaurant at Globe, walked to the capitol building, declining all offers of automobiles. Standing near Hunt while the oath was being read was Governor Thomas J. Marshall of Indiana, a personal friend, and Richard E. Sloan, Arizona's last territorial governor. There was no long program of speech making.

In his inaugural address Governor Hunt said that he believed in progressive principles, which he intended to carry out, and that he also believed in economy. His administration, he said, would be along business lines rather than political, and the interests of the people always would be his first consideration.

The plea of Governor Hunt for a simple, quiet, decorous ceremony was forgotten. The air was rent by wild west shouts and yells, the shrieking of whistles and the heavy report of bombs.

BRYAN IN BACKGROUND

William Jennings Bryan, who came to the capitol with Governor Hunt yesterday, remained in seclusion until 2 o'clock this afternoon, when, after the parade insisted upon by the citizens, he delivered an address to 5,000 or more persons in the city hall plaza.

GRAND JURY REFUSES TO INDICT H. F. BREMER

AUBURN, Feb. 14.—Shasta county's grand jury declined today to return an indictment against H. F. Bremer, son of a wealthy South Carolina brewer, who was charged with the murder of Thomas Rafferty near this city in April, 1911. Bremer was arrested in Montgomery, Ala., last autumn, and fought extradition up to the court of last resort. His father came to California with him and testified today before the grand jury.

LONG BURIED COIN DUG UP IN GARDEN

SAUSALITO TO BE A CITY BEAUTIFUL

SAUSALITO, Feb. 14.—Trustee L. C. Pistolesi introduced a resolution which was passed by the trustees at their meeting here tonight to remove all advertising signs and billboards within the town limits of Sausalito and allow the wild flowers to attract the visitor's eye to the beauties of Marin county and California. The resolution was adopted, and all advertising firms will be notified immediately to remove all signboards. Another resolution was adopted to bond the town for \$100,000 for street improvements. The present road running from Fort Baker reservation to Sausalito and through the town to the county road will be made 40 feet wide and macadamized.


ROBBERY SUSPECT TAKEN
