MARRIAGE A THORN IN BOARD'S SIDE

School Directors Must Decide Eligibility of Teacher Who Became Bride

The schools committee of the board of education again is called upon to pass upon the eligibility of a woman who marries being appointed a regular teacher in the school department.

The question has come up on a recommendation by the board that R. Wilbur be not appointed a regular teacher in the department, notwithstanding the superintendent of schools has recommended her for election.

The law holds that while a woman cannot be prohibited by the rules of the board from marrying while in the department, it has been held that the board has the power to enforce its rule that "No married woman shall be appointed to any teaching or supervising position in the public schools."

The reason given for the refusal to elect her a regular teacher is that she was married before being recommended for election. On the other hand, it is claimed that she was in the department during the two years after such assignment, namely, that of being able to prove her ability to teach and manage a class, and that although a conditional teacher, she was in the department, regularly receiving her salary.

It is also claimed she has been a teacher since her assignment, that she might have been dropped at any time by the board, and that her formal election as a regular teacher would be merely an endorsement of a competent teacher.

The schools committee will present a report at the next meeting.
