Coast, Northwest and Union League Magnates Pick Up Live Local Youngsters

The Seal squad, or at least that portion of it which has made its presence known to Manager Danny Long, will start this afternoon for the training camp at Paso Robles. Long has signed up something like 35 men who hail from all portions of the country. About a dozen of these have bowed their way into the city thus far. The others are supposed to be riding in Pullmans, but, according to the views of the long suffering fans, they are making the trip in boxcars or else doing a turn on the brakes.

The chances are that the entire squad will not show at Paso Robles for nearly a week. The regular players whom Long has been looking for since the week dawned are still on their way. If they all show today the Seal boss will have quite a time checking them up. If they don't show he will lead his handful to the training grounds anyhow.

First Baseman W. R. Jackson of Texas made his debut yesterday. Accompanied by his wife and two babies, the newcomer registered at the Continental hotel and immediately introduced himself to Harry McArdle, Howard Mundorf and the other tossers who were hanging around.

McArdle is a left hander of medium build and athletic appearance. He had a tryout on the initial sack with the Philadelphia Nationals a few seasons back and, while very well thought of up in the big brush, he was turned back because of too many candidates for the job. Jackson started out as a pitcher. He is rated as a coming good hitter and a fast man on the base.

He was discovered by Long when the latter was down in Texas attending the convention last November. Kid Mohler and Roy Corhan are sure to be here this morning. According to advices from Mohler, they departed from Los Angeles last evening. As a general rule, Major never does show till the last minute.

Corhan would have been several days ago but for Mohler. He dropped off in Los Angeles on his way from New Mexico to visit the Seal captain, and the latter held him down in the southern country. Corhan is one player whom Long is not worrying about, because he knows that the Chicago youngster is in good hands when knocking around with the captain of the team.

The boss of the Seal squad has issued instructions to all his men to report this afternoon at 1 o'clock at the ball park, where he will hold a final review before the boys board the train for Paso Robles. There is no danger that Danny will strain his eyes in looking over the present handful. He is still pulling for a bunch of them to drop in this morning.

They are bled to start for the springs at 4:30 o'clock this afternoon, arriving there five or six weeks later. There are rumors of a sort of reception by the townfolk of Paso Robles, all of which will be very nice for the tossers. Long stands willing to make a speech when he is called upon, and Captain Mohler will also be expected to respond.
