Arcadia, Once Gamblers' Mecca,  
Votes "Dry"; Drawn Battle at Glendale

Everywhere the Fair Sex Was  
Dominant in the Struggle  
for Progress

LOS ANGELES, April 8.—Nearly every incorporated town and city in southern California voted today for municipal officers, and in many of them the liquor question was a dominant issue.

Probably the hottest fight in the towns near Los Angeles was at Glendale, where 31 candidates fought for the three trusteeships. It will require the official count to determine the result.

B. Woodbury, city clerk since Glendale was incorporated, was not opposed, neither was Treasurer G. B. Hoffman.

The Progressive league, chiefly women, claimed the election of their three candidates for trustees, but this was not conceded.

At Venice the women outnumbered the men two to one, and as a result, the Good Government league scored a victory over the City club forces. C. S. Thatcher was re-elected clerk, J. W. Lawrence city treasurer.

ARCADIA GOES "DRY"

Newport, for years a "dry" town, voted "wet" 193 to 47. Arcadia, old time mecca for horse race men and gamblers from all over the world, went "dry" for the first time.

Through the efforts of the women, a majority of 91 was reported in favor of the "dry" ticket in a total vote of 223, about 95 per cent of the registration.

Claremont, out of a registration of 500 only 50 votes were recorded, incumbents being re-elected.

Vernon voted "wet." Thomas Furlong was re-elected clerk, Herman Schuler treasurer.

At Imperial the "wets" claim the victory by 290; but the "drys" do not concede it. The final count will be known only tomorrow.

Elizaville re-elected C. P. Carter clerk. He is also city recorder, justice of the peace and deputy tax collector. Robert Kirkpatrick was elected treasurer.

They were "wets." Redondo elected George Cate treasurer over Mrs. Mary Gulliver by 10 votes. Cate held office 17 years.

The women determined to defeat him. The total vote was 66.

At Hermosa City Improvement was the issue. E. S. Smith and George Cleveland, civic improvers, were elected clerk and treasurer.

"Watts" went "dry." The women were rewarded with a majority of 96. Miss Sarah Smith was elected treasurer, J. T. Alexander clerk.

South Pasadena had no particular issue, but 3,851 out of 5,200 voted. W. L. Cox was elected clerk, Charles Munger treasurer.

Burbank voted "dry" by five majority. Burbank voted to incorporate, 269 to 62.

At Sierra Madre the administration, championed by the women, was retained.

"Wets" Snowed Under

SANTA JOSE, April 8.—Three or four Santa Clara county cities today went on record against the licensing of saloons, but at Hollister, the county seat of San Benito, an adjoining county, the "wets" captured the city, 684 to 511.

Effort is being made to put the liquor issue on the ballot for the municipal election at San Jose, May 20.

Mountain View went "dry" by 40 votes, 234 for license, 222 against.

Walter Clark and W. P. Wright were elected long term trustees. W. H. McCorkle short term. S. A. Winegar was elected clerk and A. P. Rogers treasurer.

In Los Gatos the "wets" were snowed under, 323 for saloons, 625 against. A feature was the contest between Mrs. Ruby M. Furlong and Rev. Ed Whiting for clerk. Winner who held the office 12 years, was victor, 2 to 1. Zedd S. Riggs was elected treasurer, without opposition; William Forleder and R. R. Bell trustees, without opposition, for the long term; W. C. Short, short term.

At Mayfield the liquor question was not on the ballot, the town being within the city and a half limit of Standard. George and L. L. Dornberger were elected trustees, W. H. Myrick clerk and Charles Ellet treasurer.

Morgan Hill went "dry" overwhelmingly. The "drys" polled 161 against 25. F. D. Edwards and G. F. Boutell, long term, and M. R. Beach, short term, were elected trustees; Claude Stark clerk, J. M. Edwards treasurer.

"Wets" Win 8, "Drys" 3

SACRAMENTO, April 8.—In 11 elections in Sacramento valley towns today the "wet" won, eight and the "drys" in three—Red Bluff, Biggs and Wheatland.

At the storm centers of the 31 elections—Red Bluff and Redding—several arrests were made, with threats of tar and feathers for some of those active in the cause of temperance.

Glenn McWilliams, a Scotch evangelist, today arrested at Redding on a charge of disturbing the peace.

At Willows the contest was the warmest in history. The men's vote was heavy and the business men's ticket, endorsed by the saloons, won. High license carried.

By the narrow margin of one vote the anti-saloon league lost the fight for no license at Lincoln. Lincoln saw one of the most exciting days in her history. Both sides claimed the election. The contest was bitter.

At Orland temperance was an issue, and T. J. Hicks, George Carter, and Chris Schmidt, friendly to temperance, were elected trustees.

At Dixon the anti-prohibitionists have a majority of the trustees. The fight was exciting.

DARLING DOGS WIN RACE  
Capture 412-Mile Alaskan Event

Terrific Pace Set  
In Drive Over  
Icy Trail

Mrs. Charles E. Darling of Berkeley and her team of malamute dogs that won the great All-Alaska race of 412 miles.

NOME, Alaska, April 8 (via Ashcroft, B. C.)—A. A. (Scotty) Allan, driving the team of malamute dogs, owned by Mrs. Charles E. Darling of Berkeley, Cal., won the all-Alaska sweepstakes, crossing the finish line at Nome at 1:32 this morning.

Allan's time for the 412 miles, from Nome to Candle and return, was 87 hours and 32 minutes, five hours and 52 minutes longer than his time last year when he won the race with the same team.

Alexander Holmson, driving John Johnson's team of Siberian wolfhounds holder of the record of 71 hours, 14 minutes and 20 seconds, was second, one hour behind Allan.

RACE WAS ARDUOUS  
Charles Johnson, driving Fox Ramsey's dogs was third, arriving half an hour after Holmson.

The Oliver dogs, driven by O. Blatchford, were in such poor condition from the drive over the snow trail that they were hopelessly outdistanced.

The race was one of the hardest in the history of the sweepstakes. Allan

was pressed hard by the three leaders during most of the drive and it was not until he was on the last 50 miles that his dogs showed their superiority and kept the pace that gave him a safe margin of victory, making an average of seven miles an hour on the home stretch. His dogs were in good condition and all were on their feet at the finish.

CAUGHT IN STORM  
Although the Darling dogs were the favorites from the first, betting was heavy and a large amount of money changed hands. The purse for this year's race was \$5,000.

The contestants had a trying time Saturday night. A severe storm was raging and progress was made with difficulty. Blatchford was lost three hours in Death valley. Natives went in search of him and guided him back to the trail. Holmson lost a dog in the storm and spent two hours finding it. He drove hard Sunday morning and caught Allan only to be outdistanced when the Malamutes made their final burst of speed.

Team's Third Race  
BERKELEY, April 8.—For the third time the team of malamutes owned by Mrs. Charles E. Darling of 2711 Piedmont avenue, captured the All-Alaska sweepstakes from Nome, Alaska, to Candle and return.

Word of her team's victory was received by Mrs. Darling at 4:30 o'clock

this afternoon in a telegram from A. A. (Scotty) Allan, the driver, who piloted the 11 malamutes to victory. Mrs. Darling was delighted at the news. The message was dated yesterday at Nome, and reads as follows:

"We have won sweepstakes."

GREAT SPORTING EVENT  
The Sweepstakes race is the greatest sporting event of Alaska. It is held annually under the auspices of the Nome Kennel club. It is a long and difficult journey, calling for the services of the best "mushers" the north-land boasts. Its path leads from Nome across the frozen surface of Bering sea, to the little settlement of Candle, and back to the starting point. A rule of the race is that every dog must be brought back, alive or dead.

It has been held four successive seasons and Mrs. Darling's dogs have been in all of the races, winning in 1908, 1911 and taking second and third places in

the races of 1909 and 1910. In all the races the dogs have been driven by "Scotty" Allan.

Mrs. Darling's team contains several famous dogs. Among them are Tom, Dick and Harry, three veterans of the trail.

"The great dash over the snow and ice has all the excitement of a horse race," said Mrs. Darling. "So interested do the people of Nome become that there is little time for sleep until it is over. The town goes almost wild when the dogs of Davis, four miles from Nome, are freed to announce the approach of those who have succeeded in finishing. The winning of this event is a great achievement in the north."

Mrs. Darling is the wife of Charles E. Darling, who deals in mining machinery. She has spent several years on the edge of the Bering sea and returned to her Berkeley home only a short time ago.

of my candidity by making Houser their opponent is a cowardly perversion of fact. They know that no one had authority to withdraw me as a candidate and that no one ever professed to have such authority or even attempted to assert. And they know, one and all, that I refused to permit Roosevelt's candidacy to be coupled with mine or to combine with him in any way. Pinchot and others who professed to be my supporters but who were in fact supporters of Roosevelt, became very impatient for Roosevelt or any other man. Pinchot thereafter called conferences of my supporters to meet at the headquarters in Washington and sought to force me into such a combination. Failing in this he called a final conference at which time he and his associates put up to me the following alternatives:

First—"That La Follette shall withdraw in favor of Roosevelt with reservations as to differences of opinion and continue to stump."

Second—"That La Follette should withdraw—but not in favor of anybody, and continue to stump, leaving the individuals of the group to take what course they choose."

I answered that I had never played that kind of politics and never would; that I had become a candidate in the contest for election of progressive republicans because I stood for certain well defined, progressive principles that I did not recognize Roosevelt as standing for these principles; that I refused absolutely to be "re-elected" for the candidacy of any other man; that I had never turned back or retreated since I was elected to a contest, and that if I were to make such a record now, I would never be able to hold up my head and look honest men in the face.

Pinchot knows that January 29 ended his connection with my candidacy, and that it was no understood when he left the headquarters after the conference on that day; that when, a few days later, I had to yield for a few days' rest and recuperation, he seized upon that opportunity to announce to the public the support which he had long been giving to Roosevelt's candidacy.
