CHAMP MAY LOOM ON FRIDAY'S CARD

Short Route Scraps at Dreamland Looked To Reveal Midweight "Hope"

The four round game seems to be the only one in sight for the fans, for a while, at least. It is not certain yet whether they will pull a big boxing stunt this month or not. But the short distance lads are looming up strong, and they will get busy into the arena tomorrow evening after a long vacation of three weeks, something unusual in this section.

Billy Weeks and Brick Burgess are down on the list to furnish the main event. They are middle weights who can waste in and make it interesting at all times. If they are lacking in boxing skill they are capable of making it up in slugger tactics, and they generally can be relied upon to step round and put up one of those rough-house exhibitions.

There seems to be a fair chance for San Francisco to tumble up to good middle weight boxer. Since the fallure of Fritz Hollan and Sailor Petrovsky, the task seems to rest with Burgess, Weeks and Otto Berg, the Astoria boy. These are the best of the coast crop, and they seem to shape up fairly well when compared with Klaus and Dillon.

Aside from middle weights, they will put up a couple of good scraps between the little fellows, Jimmy Carroll is to meet Jimmy Follow at the 122 pound mark, and this is sure to produce the necessary action. Carroll has the experience, but his opponent is a coming youngster with a rushing style and plenty of cleverness, and should give our veteran a hard time of it.

Eddie Camp, the bantam weight champion of the coast, will mix up with Eddie Lynch, the middle weight, and if Lynch can only make a stand against him he will be in line for many other good matches in the near future.

Peter Jensen, who hopes to succeed his countryman, Pat Nelson, as the lightweight champion, will meet Rufe Turner, the old time negro lightweight from Stockton. The Dane is going into the ring simply to show the fans of San Francisco what he has in his make-up, and if he makes good with a knock-out, he may look for him to be a main event performer very shortly.

There will be five other bouts on the card between all sorts of boxers, with the exception of the heavy weights. They will line up as follows:

Young Watanabe vs. Willie Hoppe, lightweights; Happy Savage vs. Charles Grande, middleweights; Eddie Burns vs. Willie Holmes, lightweights; Johnny Murphy vs. Joe Ketchel, featherweights; George Hall vs. Gene Ferry, bantam weights.

WASHINGTON LINE TO INVADE SOUTH

Northern Collegians Will Arrive April 14 for Series With Varsity Teas

BERKELEY, April 10.—The University of Washington baseball team will arrive in San Francisco April 14, and during the two weeks following will meet the representatives of four California colleges on the diamond. Owing to a faculty ruling the northern team will leave somewhat sooner than was at first contemplated, April 27 being set originally as the date of departure.

A series of three games each will be played with the University of California and Stanford university. Santa Clara and St. Mary's will each meet the northerners in one game.

Washington is credited this year with one of the finest teams ever turned out at that institution. It is keeping the blue and gold boys in shape for the coming contests, two or three afternoons each week being devoted to practice.

2 Former Champs to Try For Tennis Title

NEW YORK, April 10.—Two former champions, Joshua Crane of Boston and Vane Pennell of England, survived the semifinal rounds of the amateur cup tennis tournament today. They will meet tomorrow in the finals, the winner of the match to receive the national championship title on Saturday.

ROSE ASKS CHANGE AT SHOTPUT MARK

Olympic Clubman Will Attempt to Lower Record Set by New Yorker

If the University of California will consent to having a special event made of the 16 pound shotput, it is possible that Ralph Rose will establish a new world's record for putting the cannon ball with both hands on Saturday.

At a recent meet held in New York, Pat McDonald, the New York Irish-American club shot putter, made a new record with both hands, sending the missile a distance of 78 feet 9 1/2 inches. For Rose this is mere toss, and he will have no trouble in breaking the record. Rose has done close to 47 feet with his left hand and at present is doing around 49 feet with his right.

The track commission of the Olympic club will confer with Trainer Walter Christie of California and endeavor to have him agree to have a special both hand put with the shot added to the program. No record will stand unless it is made at the meet and the meet on Saturday during the varsity and Olympic clubmen is looked on as an opportune time at which to establish a record.

Christie's men are rounding into great form, though the rain during the last few days has interfered with the training considerably.

The track commission of California is too soft for work at present and if the rain does not let up today the meet may have to be abandoned.

Columbia Park Boys to Hold Field Meet

The second intersub field day of the Columbia Park club will be held on Sunday, April 21, at the South side playground track. Medals will be awarded the boys establishing new records.

Seven clubs will be represented, four afternoon clubs and three evening clubs. The Friday afternoon club won the last meet for the afternoon division and the Tuesday evening club secured the honors for the evening athletes.

The weight system will prevail in the evening club competitions. Three weights—90 pounds, 110 pounds and unlimited—will be the divisions.

Andrew Costell in the 90 pound class, James Sims in the 110 pound class and Andrew Ptery in the unlimited class are showing to good advantage in training. Willie Dawson of the afternoon club, holds the half mile record with 2 minutes and 30 seconds. The present form he is expected to considerably lower these figures. More than 470 boy athletes have entered for the meet.

Solano Field Meet to See Records Fall

U. W. of Faculty Edict Cripples 'Nine'

SEATTLE, April 10.—Three regulars and three substitutes of the University of Washington's baseball team were declared ineligible to play in the California trip next week by the faculty committee on athletics yesterday.

The men who were ruled out of the game by the faculty were Jack Conner, shortstop; Ward Arney, shortstop; J. Edward Beck, pitcher; Elyer, substitute catcher; Graham, substitute third baseman and outfielder; and Morrison, substitute catcher.

With Beck out the game, Coach Hurley's team will have only two seasoned pitchers, Johnson and Boatman, both right handers, for the games with Stanford and California. The loss of Conner and Arney leaves the team in a deep predicament to find a man for shortstop.

Hurley has not definitely decided on the personnel of the team that will make the southern trip.
