U. C. CLASSES TO AID BUSINESS MEN

Academic and Technical Instruction Offered at Summer Session

Lectures to Cover Special Fields for Education at Evening Classes

BERKELEY, April 17.—A university for the "tired business man," with evening sessions during the summer, is the latest educational venture of the University of California.

Courses at the summer session which will open June 24 will provide an opportunity for men to receive academic and technical instruction a few hours each week, with extended lectures covering special fields.

LECTURES ON LITERATURE In the domain of literature five lectures will be given each week for six weeks on "The History of American Literature," by Prof. Edwin Winfield Bowen of Randolph-Macon college.

"Public Health" will be discussed in a series of semipopular lectures Tuesday and Thursday evenings. Dr. Wilbur A. Sawyer of the state hygiene laboratory will be in charge.

LAW CLASSES FOR LAYMEN Dr. Maurice E. Harrison will talk on "Commercial Law," taking up for non-professional students the principles of business law, contracts, sales, partnerships, agency, shipping, rights and remedies of creditors, bankruptcy and insolvency.

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Political science lectures will be given Tuesdays and Thursdays by Prof. Thomas H. Reed.

STEPHEN W. GILMAN, professor of business administration in the University of Wisconsin, will discuss the organization and management of typical industries.

DRAMA AND ART "Modern Spanish Drama," a course of lectures in Spanish, will be given Tuesday and Thursday evenings by Prof. Aurelio Madedonlo Espinosa of Stanford university.

Prof. Oliver E. Washburn, dean of the lower division of the University of California, will give five lectures a week on "Greek Art" at the Museum of Archaeology.

LONDON ASKED TO ARREST 'ABRAHAM'

Forger Known as "Sir Harry Cooper" Changes Alias as He Travels

OAKLAND, April 17.—Additional information of the movements of Dr. Milton Abraham, forger and bigamist, known also as "Sir" Harry Westwood Cooper and Ernest Moore Chadwick, who left Oakland February 9 with Miss Anna Milbrath, his sixth wife of record, was furnished today by a second telegram to the girl's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Herman Milbrath, 1902 Sixty-third street, from her brother, Benjamin Milbrath.

The girl said that Abraham used three aliases which were in London and changed his name whenever they went to another city. These aliases are now known to acting Chief of Police Petersen and have been sent to the state department at Washington, which in turn has asked the London authorities to arrest Abraham.

Petersen blames the New York and the British police for not making the arrest. He intends to make a long stay at the home of her brother, and her return to Oakland is problematical.

"No information regarding the whereabouts of Abraham has been received from my daughter," said Mrs. Milbrath. "She is at the home of her brother, Benjamin, in Gary, Ind., arriving there last Monday evening from London, Eng., where she passed her honeymoon with the man who so basely deceived her."

"There is no doubt in my mind that Abraham has fled from England. It will be difficult to catch him, as he will change his name wherever he goes and will evade the police."

The charges against Abraham are: Bigamy, for marrying Miss Anna Milbrath in Oakland, obtaining \$700 from Mr. and Mrs. Milbrath by false pretenses; uttering a forged draft on the Bank of New Zealand for \$3,000.

WOOD WANTS VETERAN TEACHERS' PAY RAISED

ALAMEDA, April 17.—In his biennial report filed with the board of education Superintendent Wood recommended that the salaries of grade teachers with more than 12 years' experience be increased \$1 a month. This would affect 48 teachers.

Wood has also recommended a course of domestic science for the Alameda high school and a kindergarten department in the Lincoln school.

For the seventh and eighth grades Wood would have the English grammar simplified, so that the students could devote time to the study of everyday English.
