

## BIG MEET ON TODAY U. C.-Stanford Out for Honors

### Geo. Horine Expected To Break His Own World's Record

Locally, athletic interest centers in the question, which university track team will win the big meet this afternoon at Stanford? The blue and gold of California, or the cardinal of Stanford? There is not much difference in the ability of the teams on paper so take your choice. The eyes of the whole athletic world of the Pacific coast will be focused on the nineteenth annual struggle today.

In other sections of this country, however, there is one event that is being watched with eagle eyes, and that is the high jump. The east, and in fact athletic circles everywhere, are anxiously waiting to see if George Horine, the present holder of the high jump record of the world, will break his own record. That Horine will take a crack at his record there is little doubt. He is in great form at present and if he is feeling strong it is expected on all sides that at this great meet today he will endeavor to shove his record up to such a height that it will stand for eternity. Horine is the only man in the world who has a chance of raising the jump to 6 feet 7 inches and today he will have the chance of his life.

When he broke the world's record a few weeks ago, his jump was such that it was practically impossible to increase the height before the present season has come to a close. In the dual meets held since then he has not made any attempt to do better than a jump to win the event, but these jumping jumps have only 5 feet 3 inches and 6 feet 4 inches. The latter was his last jump in competition, and today on his own track if everything is favorable he will no doubt essay the great feat of breaking his own wonderful record.

On paper the teams engaged in the meet today figure out pretty even, but the past records of California and Stanford should win the struggle with a scant margin. The lads from the "army" are not exactly looking for a victory and if anything there is a feeling that the blue and gold has slight edge of the best of the two sections, Stanford has a good fighting chance.

The hammer and shot events will be the first on the program, but in neither of these can the Stanford men hope to win out, though of course there is always a chance that gives them a chance. Carl Shattuck looks a sure winner with the 16 pound hammer, and Floyd Rice should win the shotput. Can Alderman of Stanford with the hammer or Woody of Stanford with the shot, head off the two blue and gold cracks? It does not look like it, but these men have good chances for second or third places.

The mile run will be the first track event last year, but this year Stanford has a good fighting chance. The hammer and shot events will be the first on the program, but in neither of these can the Stanford men hope to win out, though of course there is always a chance that gives them a chance.

though none of the blue and gold men has equaled this figure in competition. The half mile promises to be a fight between Woods of California and Freshman Bonet of Stanford. Murray, Fletcher and Angell are three more Stanford men figured in, while California has two good finishers in Heison and Griffiths. Bonet has shown real class and if he is pressed to the limit he will have a chance of lowering Doud's record of 1 minute 58 1-5 seconds. The two mile is conceded on all sides to Crabbe of California, with Dodge of Stanford, Rathbone and Hamley of California fighting out for the other places. Crabbe ran a wonderful race some few weeks ago, making the remarkable time of 9 minutes 55 seconds, and here another record is threatened. Crabbe holds the present intercollegiate record with 9 minutes 53 seconds, made in the meet last year at Stanford.

In the hurdles Ed Benson, the California champion, should score a double if he is right. The pole vault should go to Vail of California, with Miller, Stevens and Boulay of Stanford making some big leaps, and with Mike Smith of California for the other points. The broad jump looks like the domain of Stanford on dope.

Special trains will run to Palo Alto for the big meet. The line one will leave Third and Townsend streets at 1 o'clock. The California train will go down Palo Alto in two sections, the hammer and shot men taking early trains in order to be on the ground for their events, which will begin at 1:30. Complete arrangements have been made at Palo Alto to handle a record crowd.

### Wilmerding and Cogswell Play Final Today

Wilmerding and Cogswell high baseball teams will play their final games of the subleague divisions this afternoon at 2:30 on the St. Ignatius diamond.

Mission high has won the B division of the subleague and it will depend on the winner of today's game as to which team will meet the Missionites for the final game to decide the championship of the subleague. Lowell is at present in the lead of two subleagues, but if Wilmerding defeats Cogswell this school will be tied with Powell and another game will have to be played to decide which team will oppose Mission.

In the 200 yard dash Captain Tom Coleman has been showing wonderful form and has done 19.1 consistently all the season. He will have two men in Fui Wood and Freshman Stanton of California against him, whose ability can not be underestimated, and though Stanton has shown his heels to Wood in more than one meet this year, Wood is known as a man equal to the emergency in the big meets. Every one of these men and another, Leo Meyer, who won the 200 yard dash last year, and Campbell and Taylor of Stanford, who will start today, and with him will be Campbell, Milas and Wallace. California will have good men Leo Meyer, Vitousek, Todd, Chase, Claudius and one or two others.
