Attack on Policemen Arouses Determination to Drive Men Out

More Than One Hundred Are Rounded up and Escorted to City Limits

SAN DIEGO, May 8.—The police of this city, aided by a large citizens' committee, have been engaged during the last 24 hours in ferreting out and deporting every Industrial Worker who was unable to escape their vigilance.

Prior to last night the force of Industrial Workers here had been receiving small accessions for weeks. It was deemed best not to molest them so long as they made no further attempts to violate the city ordinance.

Last night the headquarters of the Industrial Workers was the scene of a sanguinary assault upon two policemen, who were shot from a second story window.

As a result of last night's attack it has been determined to rid the city of every industrial worker who is not awaiting trial.

Some attention is paid to the comfort of the industrial workers on the long march. This morning there are about a hot cup of coffee, a loaf of fresh bread and a boiled egg for breakfast.

Joe Nikolash, the industrial worker who was shot in the forehead, presumably when the police were attacked, died late this afternoon.
