STOCK FRAUD CHARGED TO \$1,500,000 FIRM

Federal indictment against Potomac Refining Company BALTIMORE, May 9.—A federal grand jury today returned an indictment against seven officers of the Potomac Refining Company, a concern capitalized at \$1,500,000, who operated in the city.

The men indicted are Michael P. Keenan, Harry C. Hensel, Louis Plack, Edward E. Cooper and Charles B. Nauder, directors of the company; Robert W. Moberg, general counsel, and A. B. Young, stock salesman.

The indictment in the sale of stock is charged.
