

**TAFT IS PRAISED AT CLOSING RALLY**  
Orators in Alameda Say He Resembles Gladstone and Bismarck

ALAMEDA, May 11.—The closing rally of the Taft campaign in this city was held here tonight. W. E. Dennison, president of the Taft Republican club, introduced John R. Wilson as chairman. William P. Herron of Stanford university said he had toured northern California in President Taft's interest and had found no sentiment growing in favor of the president's renomination. "President Taft is no spectacular politician, but he is close to the hearts of the American people," said Herron. Frank McGowan said that the reason of opposition to Taft's renomination was that the president had refused to be dictated by Theodore Roosevelt. "Taft is sincere in public life and in all his public acts," said McGowan. "He is conservative and a man of justice and peace. The greatest statesmen in the world were conservative, notably Gladstone and Bismarck. Taft is right on the tariff. If you elect Roosevelt for a third term you will throw in one of the safeguards of the republic."

**COUPLE TO CELEBRATE GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY**  
Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Hayden to Receive at Home

OAKLAND, May 11.—John L. Hayden and Mrs. Elvira Roosevelt Hayden will celebrate their golden wedding anniversary tomorrow at their home in Eleventh avenue near East Twenty-fourth street. The affair will be an informal "at home" between 2 and 5 o'clock in the afternoon. The Haydens were married at Flint, Mich., May 12, 1862. Up to 1880 they lived at Saginaw, Mich., when they removed to California, coming to this city from Escondido two years ago. Mrs. Hayden is directly related to the family of Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, her father, Cornelius Roosevelt, being a cousin of Colonel Roosevelt's grandfather, in New York city. She was educated at a private seminary at Washington, D. C. Hayden is a retired lumber commission and mining dealer and in several years he was deputy inspector general of the lumber industry in Michigan. He is the oldest living white person who was born in Saginaw county, Michigan. He erected one of the earliest quartz mills in Colorado in the early sixties, at a point near Denver. Mrs. W. H. Toussay, who twice escaped from bandit gangs in Sinaloa, Mexico, where she had been staying with her daughter during the disturbances of the last year, and Mrs. Francis R. Thompson of 229 Grove street, sisters of Mrs. Hayden, will be present. Among the invited guests will be Rev. Mr. and Mrs. George E. Allen of East Oakland, who celebrated their golden wedding five years ago. Mrs. Nina R. Compton will assist Mrs. Hayden in receiving her guests tomorrow.

OAKLAND, May 11.—After eluding the police for a week to avoid testifying against James Reed, alias "Foghorn" Reed, whom he had arrested and feared to prosecute, Dominic Mazzoni was found by Corporal James Flynn and Inspector Thomas Wood and brought into court today. Mazzoni admitted that he had been in hiding in Wild Cat canyon, back of the Berkeley hills, and that he had feared to prosecute Reed because Reed's friends, said to be former associates of the ex-convict in the penitentiary, had threatened his life. The preliminary hearing of the charge of grand larceny against Reed was commenced today before Judge George Samuel and will be continued Monday. The examination was halted while the police were searching for the complaining witness.

**"HOLD UP" GIVES NOTICE OF SHOW**

Fifteen Cowboys of the Dell Eagles' Congress of Rough Riders Run Amuck

OAKLAND, May 11.—Fifteen cowboys of the Dell Eagles' congress of rough riders held up a traveling man in Washington street this evening at 8 o'clock and then shot up the Crellin hotel. The Dell Eagles company will be the big attraction at the "Frontier Days" carnival of the Moose at the Grove street ball grounds next week, and everybody in town realized that the holdup tonight was a fake except one youthful policeman. When the officer showed signs of losing his judgment two of the cowboys placed empty pistols at his stomach and held him at bay while the fun went on. The regular officer on the beat was an interested spectator. The young officer finally sent in a riot call, but before Captain of Police Frank Lynch and Sergeant Woods arrived on the scene Sheriff Frank Barnett, who will be grand marshal of the Moose parade next Wednesday, had "subdued" the cowboys. The downtown section of the city will be a mass of bunting and flags when the big parade of the Moose and Dell Eagles' congress of rough riders starts moving from the Moose club rooms Wednesday at noon. Sheriff Frank Barnett has been appointed grand marshal of the parade. He will select his aids Monday. At Friday night's meeting of the Moose 20 delegates from the progress and prosperity committee of the Chamber of Commerce, headed by Chairman W. A. Wann, attended and assured the lodgesmen of the co-operation and support of their committee. The equestrian clubs of the county will take part in the parade and the performances at the open rough riding grounds. One division of the parade will be composed entirely of local horsemen and horsewomen. Many additional entries have been received for the open rough riding and steer wrestling events.
