

### GLOBE TRAVELER IS SUED FOR DIVORCE

Mrs. Charles W. McDonald Claims Husband Has No Legal Residence; Other Cases

That Charles Wood McDonald, oil land operator of Kern county and Mexico, has no legal residence is the allegation in an affidavit filed yesterday by Mrs. Florence C. McDonald, daughter of James H. Forland, wealthy insurance man, with whom she is staying at 2619 Pacific avenue.

The letter upon which Mrs. McDonald places most stress says: "If you succeeded in getting judgment against me you will not collect it, for in such case I will not return to the United States. I would rot in a foreign prison cell rather than submit to the enforced demands of trickery."

### HUSBAND WRITES LETTERS

Another letter, dated in Mexico, December 17, 1911, asks Mrs. McDonald to make an appointment for a meeting at San Francisco for the purpose of seeing her and their son "Billy." In this letter McDonald writes that he intends to leave for Buenos Aires after the interview.

Another letter in which the husband writes that he has no desire to ask the wife for forgiveness and saying that he does not intend to return to the United States is also quoted. Mrs. McDonald claims that she has no knowledge of her husband's whereabouts.

### SETTLEMENT OF FOREST AREA BEING ENCOURAGED

The Forest service of California has listed 1,504 homesteads upon forest reserves in this state since the passage of the act of Congress of June 11, 1906, which provides for giving homes to settlers upon tracts susceptible to cultivation. The forest service encourages the settlement of areas that can be cultivated, and the criticism that the government withholds settlement that sometimes is heard emanates from those who have been unsuccessful in locating valuable timber lands, according to the forest officers. More than 1,200 such applications have been rejected.

### SHIPPERS INDORSE BONDED DISTRICTS

Resolutions Urging Passage of Bill Sent to Underwood and California Congressmen

Resolutions strongly indorsing Congressman Kahn's bill for the establishment and regulation of bonded districts at United States ports have been adopted by a number of the foremost shipping men of California and forwarded to Chairman Underwood of the house committee on ways and means.

The bonded district bill provides for an extension of the bonded warehouse system, so that within the prescribed district commercial freedom may prevail and manufacturing may be carried on free of duty. The object of the bill is to secure such a district for San Francisco by 1915, the belief being that it would give a new impetus to commercial relations with the orient.

### RABBI MEYER WAKENS CITY TO FIRE MENACE

Says Doors on Many Public Buildings Open Inward

The fire commission, in a letter to the supervisors yesterday, called attention to the necessity of an ordinance providing that doors in all public buildings shall open outward in order to provide a quick exit in time of fire.

"I need not refer to the Collingwood fire of a few years back," writes Rabbi Meyer, "where scores of lives were sacrificed because of lack of this petty, yet important, precaution."

The fire commissioners also transmitted to the supervisors a report showing that practically every school in the city needs additional fire protection.

### SPIRO-O'GRADY HEARING POSTPONED BY MAYOR

Delays Action Pending Result of Court Proceedings

Mayor Rolph evidently believes that Police Commissioners Spiro and O'Grady will not win their case in court. The writs of prohibition which the suspended commissioners secured from Judge Sewell have temporarily tied the mayor's hands, so the hearing of the charges against the commissioners, which was to have taken place in the mayor's office yesterday afternoon, was postponed until May 21.

The court proceedings are set for next Friday. The mayor allowed time for Judge Sewell to decide on the merits of the case. He notified the defendant commissioners of the postponement.


