

POLICE FINDING A SOLUTION TO BUNGALOW CASE

Evidence Shows Woman Killed in Los Angeles Was Miss Quinn of Chicago

Stronger Clues Point to Man Killed by Chicago Train as the Slayer

CHICAGO, May 20.—Chicago and Los Angeles police tonight are working upon the theory that the murdered woman whose body was found in a bungalow on the outskirts of the California city on May 7 was Miss Minnie Quinn.

According to Smith, Miss Quinn received calls while in her employment from a man named Evanston, who was an Evanston electrician.

Smith said she declared she intended to marry Dillon, C. D. Dillon, who was killed by a train in a suburb last Saturday and who is thought by the police to have been the slayer of the woman in Los Angeles, was an electrician.

Dr. J. S. Pressnell told the detectives that a young woman, giving the name of Minnie Quinn, had been at the address at Winnetka, called on him last January and asked him to perform an operation for her. He refused, he said, and she went away and never returned.

Relatives of Miss Quinn told the police tonight that the traveling bag found in Dillon's home, which is thought to bear bloody finger prints, belonged to her.

S. F. MAN MARRIED ON BOARD EXPRESS TRAIN

W. E. Kellar Claims Fellow Passenger as His Third Bride

Medford, Ore., May 20.—W. E. Kellar of Los Angeles, a well known capitalist of that city and president of the Globe Grain and Milling company of San Francisco, was married last night to his third wife while en route to Portland on a train of the Southern Pacific.

Kellar telegraphed ahead to Medford, impressing the local attention of the service, and through the latter's persuasions a clergyman and a deputy county clerk with the necessary legal forms boarded the train when it reached this city.

Kellar was married to his second wife, who was Mrs. R. J. McKenzie, a widow, January 15, 1911. She secured a divorce from him within the last week at El Paso.

AUTOIST KILLED WHEN CAR STRIKES TREE

TWO PERSONS SEEN TO LEAVE SCENE OF CRIME

Man and Woman, It Is Said, Were at House on Morning Cohen's Body Was Found

Coroner's Jury Is Impaneled and Visits Premises at 1338 Steiner Street

Coroner T. B. W. Leland yesterday impaneled a jury to investigate the death of Isaac Cohen, whose body, shot through the abdomen, was found in a vacant house at 1338 Steiner street, Saturday morning.

The jury is composed of: E. Simeanier, Leon Levy, H. E. Clayburg, F. Straub, J. Eckstein, R. McBlain, W. A. Devine, M. N. Goldtree, M. Rosenthal, A. M. Collyer, Ed Dreyfus.

MURDER STILL MYSTERY The murder of Cohen, with robbery the motive, still remains an unsolved mystery. The detectives have worked day and night since the discovery of the body, running down possible clues, and every effort has been made to locate the woman involved.

The officers detailed on the case have been searching for a deck of miniature playing cards that they think may aid in fastening the crime on the guilty persons. Some of the cards are covered with blood. They were found scattered in the room where Cohen was murdered, and they were not there Monday afternoon, according to Mrs. Shultz, who was in the house at that time.

Myron Chadwick of 1658 Eddy street reported to Detective James Mackey last night that he saw a man and woman leave the house where Cohen's body was found at 1:30 Tuesday morning. The detectives questioned Chadwick closely in the hope that he might be able to give a description of the persons he believed to have seen.

CARD GIVES CLUE Another clue followed that suggested by the finding of a card bearing the name Gusste and the address 10 Bartlett alley. A woman named Gusste is believed to have been in the neighborhood.

While Cohen seemed to be well known about town, the detectives say that they are unable to get any information as to his life outside of business hours, with whom he associated at nights, or how he spent his time. The only thing they have satisfied themselves upon is that he carried a big roll of money, and that he was in the habit of buying diamonds or other jewelry when a bargain was presented.

FILIPINO MAID'S HISTORY IS A HAIR RAISING ONE

Tribe Would Have Dined on Wee Felicidad

The most interesting passenger on the liner China, which arrived yesterday from the orient, was Felicidad, a curly haired pygmy from the island of Luzon. Felicidad is a young lady of 10 summers, with a colorado maduro complexion and a pair of jet black eyes. She weighs 45 pounds.

Felicidad is a Negrita—one of the aboriginal tribes of the Philippines—and a few years ago was doomed to die as a sacrifice to appease the wrath of the gods who had sent the plague to destroy her tribe.

Her father and mother were plague victims, as were all her brothers and sisters. The head men of the tribe decided that the child girl had escaped the rest of the tribe might be saved if they killed and ate Felicidad. It was so ordered, and the program would have been carried out but for a Mrs. Abreu, a wealthy Philippine woman, who was sojourning in the Zamballs mountains, where the sacrifice was going to be celebrated. She bought Felicidad from the tribe for 50 pesos and later adopted the child.

Mrs. Abreu died recently, but before her death gave Felicidad to Miss Jessie Durham, who is supervisor of schools of the fourth district of Manila. Miss Durham, who is a sister of Mrs. Lloyd Osbourne, came home on the China to spend her vacation in the United States and brought Felicidad with her.

Felicidad, a Negrita girl who arrived here yesterday on the China and who, a few years ago, was bought for 50 pesos, after the people of her tribe had decided to kill and eat her.

AD MEN GATHER FOR CONVENTION

Dallas Welcomes Publicity Men From All Parts of the Nation

DALLAS, Tex., May 20.—Advertising men from all parts of the nation reached Dallas today for the beginning of the annual meeting of the Associated Advertising Clubs of America. The first feature today was the automobile parade.

There were fanfares of "publicity" from almost every city in the union. Prior to the parade there were welcoming addresses by Governor Colquitt and Mayor Holland. At a second business session reports of committees were heard and advertising men told of improvements in their methods and work.

The membership of the Associated Advertising Clubs of America has increased nearly 70 per cent in the last year. President George W. Coleman said in his annual report. The membership of clubs enrolled increasing from 99 to 130. The new clubs represent 19 different states, territories and provinces, as widely separated as Maine, California and the Hawaiian islands.

Coleman suggested that advertising is opening a great field of usefulness for women who appreciate the enormous influence of advertising in the home.

So stood the vote in this city on the several candidates for president at the primary election last Tuesday, according to the official canvass, which was completed yesterday afternoon by Registrar J. H. Zemansky.

San Francisco's total vote last Tuesday was 62,407, of which 50,407 were counted as republican and 11,418 as democratic. Less than half the registered vote was cast at the primary election, the total registration for the city being 136,190 with 86,653 republican and 49,291 democratic, the rest being socialists, prohibitionists and those who declined to give their party affiliation.

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U. S. WILL ATTACK S. P. OIL HOLDINGS

Government Officials Plan to Charge Gigantic Conspiracy Formed in 1904

LOS ANGELES, May 20.—Federal officials here announced today that within six weeks the entire holdings of the Southern Pacific railroad company in the oil sections of California will be attacked by the government.

The railroad's holdings in the state are worth millions, comprising much of the richest oil lands known. The next step in the hearing involving the Elk Hill lands, which the government is now seeking to reclaim, will be an investigation of the company's books in San Francisco. The hearing has been adjourned until June 1, when Special Assistant Attorney General W. A. Mills and Federal District Attorney A. I. McCormick will go to San Francisco to wind up the government's case.

Through a copy of a lease, the government contended to have proved the existence of a gigantic conspiracy, formed, it was said, by Southern Pacific officials in 1904, to obtain oil lands in the state worth millions. The officials of the company knew it was alleged that the land they selected as agricultural was in reality rich oil land bearing territory and that patents were rushed through in the name of the Kern Trading and Oil company. The government charges that this company is nothing but a "dummy" and is in reality the Southern Pacific company itself.

Mills left for Washington today and will present to the attorney general the facts upon which a blanket attack will be framed.
