Want Navigation Congress to Remedy Alleged Evils

[Special Dispatch to The Call] PHILADELPHIA, May 26.—The International Navigation congress is urged to take up the question of ameliorating the condition of ocean sailing seamen in a petition signed by Andrew Furuseth, president of the International Seamen's union, and the executive committee of the union.

It is believed by the Seamen's union that all who wish to go to sea, except in the domestic trade, are under the United States law to sign a contract fixed by law or authorized by the various foreign governments which practically makes slaves of them.

S. C. U. FORMALLY TO DEDICATE BUILDINGS


Ceremonies Will Take Place on June 16
