YOUNG AU THORP PUBLISHES BOOK OF UNUSUAL MERIT

Financial History of the State Treated

BERKELEY, May 28.—The University of California will publish in a few months a book by William Charles Fankhauser, Ph.D., entitled "A Financial History of California." Fankhauser for the last three years has been a graduate student and flood fellow in the college of commerce...

Members of the faculty were not slow to appreciate the young student's achievement. The copy of his thesis was at once put into shape for publication, Fankhauser being aided in this by Professor Charles F. Smith, professor of finance and deviser of the new state revenue system...

SCOPE OF THE WORK—"I did not get data of great value from the newspapers," Fankhauser said. "I found in all official reports only one view of matters treated. I went to the newspapers to get diverse or, at least, popular views. What I got out of real value was a conception, a general impression, which I utilized in writing."

For this the University of California has appointed a doctor of philosophy and will publish his book. The state has recognized his ability as an economist and he now is connected with the department of statistics and accounting of the state railroad commission...

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OAKLAND COMMISSIONERS PASS RESOLUTION REFUSING CONSIDERATION OF ORDINANCE

OAKLAND, May 28.—The city council today adopted a resolution giving reasons why the substitute ordinance submitted by James H. Pedgrift, a contractor, for the one appointing J. J. Donovan city architect, should not be made a law. These reasons, which must be printed on the referendum petition, Pedgrift says will circulate to put the question up to the voters, are as follows:

Work of preparing plans in progressing rapidly and satisfactorily under the ordinance which experience has proved to be complete and ample to secure the results required and to protect the interests of the people of the city. The only difference between the proposed ordinance and the ordinance now in force is: First—That the proposed ordinance places an unreasonable and arbitrary, and in all probability, an unconstitutional restriction upon the time an architect must maintain his office in Oakland before he can do work for the city. Second—It undertakes the impossible task of amending the charter by means of an ordinance delegating to the council certain powers and duties of the commissioner of public works. Third—It would change the method of progress payment of a contract for public work so that it would be paid in advance of the completion of the work. Fourth—It eliminates certain experts; no saving is thereby made, since the matter of appointing experts is now left to the discretion of the council; no such experts have been appointed, and, probably, will not be appointed, and their appointment would delay completion of school buildings and auditorium and would result in financial loss to the city.

CORNERSTONE WILL BE PLACED THIS MORNING

RICHMOND, May 28.—Without ceremony, that being reserved for the dedication of the school building, the cornerstone of the \$70,000 schoolhouse in Twelfth street was laid this morning. Rapid progress is being made in the construction of the building. The structure in Montana avenue is progressing at the same rate. It is intended to have both buildings open for the September term. The board of education, consisting of O. A. Poulsen, E. J. Jones and J. O. Ford, and Superintendent W. T. Helms, will arrange an elaborate program for the dedications.
