CLUB DEMANDS MORE PIPES IN WATER SYSTEM

Question of Supply Topic of Discussion by Laurel Grove Organization

Resolution Calls for Extension of Hopkins Line Across Upper Fruitvale

OAKLAND, June 23.—The question of the water supply was the topic of discussion at the meeting this week of the Laurel Grove Improvement club.

At the meeting of the Steinyard Terrace club the fire committee reported the housing of the chemical fire engine on the W. G. B. Erdman place.
