

ABOUT BUILDS ARE UNSIGHTLY

Board of Experts Condemns the Conditions Found at the Hall of Justice

Report Says Large Sums Are Necessary to Put Structures in Proper Shape

A haphazard manner of construction in the new hall of justice and the need of \$10,500 to put the building in satisfactory condition, nonproof construction in the new girls' high school and the deficit of \$1,077,200 in the funds necessary to complete the San Francisco hospital are among the startling conditions found by the consulting board of architects in municipal buildings, according to their report submitted yesterday to Mayor Ralph.

KNELL OF HAT PIN SOUNDED

The Kilmann hat pin ordinance, originated and drafted by Frank J. Kilmann of the board of health, was recommended to the board of supervisors yesterday by a unanimous vote of the members of the health board after they had engaged in a long and heated discussion of whether regulation of hat pins was within jurisdiction of the commission.

COMPETITION FOR PLACES URGED

The supervisors' public buildings committee, with the exception of Supervisor Bancroft, adopted a resolution yesterday providing that the plans for all monumental buildings to be erected within the civic center be secured by architectural competition, with the exception of buildings like the proposed auditorium, which are controlled by the city. Incidentally, at least two of the three members of the consulting board of architects, John Galen Howard and John Reid Jr., appear to be much peeved at the action of the committee, which will take out of their hands the preparation of all civic center buildings.

Appel of the defense, which resulted in the imposition of a fine of \$25 for contempt, were features of today's session of the bribery trial of Clarence S. Darrow.

TRAP LAID FOR DARROW

Burns testified that he knew of only one man in his employ who was a spy in the same way as the one he employed and that he had no men in his employ who betrayed the secrets of the defense. He also testified that he had seen Darrow at all times of the trap laid for Darrow by Detective Guy Biddinger, who took Darrow's money while pretending to betray the secrets of the McNamara prosecution.
