

EVENTS IN THE COAST CITIES BORDERING ON BAY OF SAN FRANCISCO

EAST BAY CITIES WILL CELEBRATE FOURTH OF JULY

Oakland, Alameda and Berkeley Have Made Elaborate Plans for Independence Day

Picnics, Regattas and Motorcycle and Horse Races Are Among Feature Events

OAKLAND, July 3.—The anniversary of the day of Independence will be celebrated in elaborate fashion by the east bay and interior cities. Though firecrackers are under taboo here, the day will be none the less an event.

Interest here will center about Lake Merritt and Lakeside park, where the literary and musical exercises will be held. The program will be held at 1 o'clock in the natural amphitheater at Lakeside park.

Rev. William Day Simons will be the orator of the day, and Joaquin Miller, a poet, Miss Juanita Miller, the poet's daughter, will give a recitation. The declaration of independence will be read by Major Edwin A. Sherman, who will also display a tiny bell made from clippings from the Liberty bell.

The exercises will close at 2:30 o'clock and will be succeeded by a band concert by the Lakeside Park band under Paul Steindorff. The afternoon on the lake will be devoted to a regatta, comprising rowing, swimming and canoeing races and aquatic sports. A special feature will be supplied in a balloon ascension in the city of Oakland by the veteran aviator, Captain A. V. Vassal, which will take place at 12:30 o'clock.

In the evening there will be a grand exhibition of fireworks from both sides of the lake. A band will be stationed on the balcony of the city hall. The various playgrounds in the city have all arranged elaborate programs for the celebration.

At the camp No. 48, United Spanish War Veterans, of Richmond and Battery B, field artillery, of this city will hold a joint military picnic and tournament at Canyon park, East Richmond. The day will be given to sports, games, baseball and military maneuvers.

The bay cities councils, Knights of Columbus, and other Catholic organizations will celebrate by holding a picnic in Fernbrook park, Niles canyon. A splendid musical, literary and athletic program has been arranged and it is expected that fully 1,000 will gather. The morning will be devoted to a literary program appropriate to the day, with a luncheon at noon. A dance will be held early in the afternoon, together with games and races and a bill posting contest.

A baseball game will ensue between the nine of the Oakland and Berkeley councils of the K. of C. Cabrillo council No. 614, Y. M. C. and Oakland council No. 784, K. of C. will engage in a tug of war contest.

The members of the E. F. Farlor, N. S. G. W., will celebrate with a picnic in Laurel Grove park, Hayward. The day will be devoted to dancing and music.

Alameda in Right Spirit
ALAMEDA, July 3.—The second day of the five day celebration under the auspices of the citizens' festival committee was marked by a crowd even larger than that which was out on the first night. The amusement grounds were crowded to overflowing after noon and evening and the Park street was gay with groups that could not get to the carnival features in "Recreation square."

A program of events in which boys and girls contend for prizes offered by the merchants of Park street occupied the greater portion of the afternoon. A pie eating contest for boys and girls created much amusement, and, to the amazement of the male contestants, a girl took second place away from them, eating her pie up clean before some of the members of the sterner sex had completed half of theirs.

Tomorrow will be a gala day, the time being crowded with events from morning till night. At 10 o'clock the decorated auto parade will start from Webster street and Santa Clara avenue. Prizes will be given for the best decorated automobile and for the most original decorative scheme. The day will be a literary program will take place in Park street immediately after the parade.

At 2 o'clock the annual regatta of the Pacific coast rowing clubs will take place on the estuary, the start being at the Park street bridge and the turn opposite Grand street. The clubs will row under the following colors: South End, white; Alameda, black; Dolphin, blue and white; San Diego, blue and white with white head band.
