FIRE FIGHTERS RISK LIVES AND RESCUE WOMEN

Police Assist in Arousing Sleepers and Carrying Them From Building

Oakland Business Block Guttured and Eight Stores and Contents Damaged

OAKLAND, July 5.—In rescuing lodgers from the rooming houses and business block at the southeast corner of Sixteenth street and San Pablo avenue at an early hour this morning...

Mrs. J. W. Reddick, an aged woman who has charge of the bachelor apartments on the upper floor of the building, was rescued by a fireman from her room, where she was groping amid smoke and flames to find her garments.

WOMEN TRAPPED BY SMOKE L. W. Simpson and wife occupied apartments at the end of the building farthest from the stairway.

DEAF AND BLIND RESCUED Difficulty was experienced in rescuing George Harpole, son of Mrs. Reddick. Harpole is deaf, and though the firemen thundered on his door, they failed to arouse him.
