

### 21 PERISH IN TRAIN WRECK ON VACATION TRIP

#### Freight Smashes Passenger From Behind and Only One Traveler Escapes

#### Thirty Injured Taken to Hospi- tals and Many Expected to Succumb

#### Engineer and Fireman Remain at Posts and Suffer Less Than Others

LATROBE, Pa., July 5.—Twenty-one persons were killed and 30 injured, a number fatally, as a result of a wreck this afternoon on the Ligonier Valley railroad at Wilpen.

An overloaded passenger coach pushed by an engine was struck by a double header freight train of coal cars, which crushed the coach like paper and caused death or injury to all but one aboard the train.

The accident occurred on a branch road running from this place to Ligonier which is owned by the Melton interests of Pittsburgh. It had been reported that the line was controlled by the Pennsylvania railroad.

Almost every home in Ligonier was affected by the accident, many relatives or friends either being dead or injured.

The railroad is an outlet for the mines of the Wilpen Coal company. The passenger train wrecked today was the only one in operation. It made two trips a day over the line, which is 10 miles in length. Up to today not a life had been lost in any manner, and this was made the boast of the officials.

#### Many in Critical State

A majority of the injured were residents along the Wilpen branch. They were brought to a hospital here or sent to hospitals at Pittsburgh, when it was found they were in a critical condition.

#### Impact Was Terrific

The impact was terrific. The freight engine plowed through the wooden coach, crushing it as if it were paper. All the occupants were hurled to the roadbed. Some fell in the path of the onrushing engines, while others were imbedded partly in the cinders and crushed stones beside the rails.

The first engine of the freight train stopped soon after tearing through the passenger train, turned half way around and fell over on its side.

Engineer McConaughy was scalded to death, while his fireman, George Byers, jumped, only to fall on the track and meet death under the wheels.

Engineer Smith P. Beatty of the second engine jumped and sustained a broken leg. His fireman, John Ankney, fell beneath a car. His legs were severed and he died en route to a hospital.

#### Death Separates Children

A pathetic feature of the wreck was the injury of Miss Esther M. Matthews, a nurse, and the death of two and the injury of four children she was taking to the woods near Wilpen for an afternoon's outing.

Farmers near the scene of the accident and workmen employed at a race-track in the vicinity were at the wreck within a few minutes. Messengers were started at once to Ligonier, while the others, assisted by Engineer Dunlap and his fireman, were busy getting the dead and injured clear of the wreckage.

Tang Shao Yi, with his family, already was on board the steamer, when the former taotal, Chang Chun, approached and introduced a friend named Wang Cheng Hsiang.

The latter promptly covered Tang Shao Yi with two pistols and demanded to know why he had run away from Nanking.

Tang Shao Yi's explanation was outwardly well received by Wang Cheng, who, however, announced that he intended to accompany Tang Shao Yi to Shanghai.

### CECELIA LOFTUS SEEKS DIVORCE

According to dispatches from Milwaukee, Mrs. Loftus sailed for England recently, after living for a time in an apartment on the lake front in the Wisconsin city for the purpose of establishing a residence.

It is her intention to file suit next year. She will not return to America until the fall.

Efforts to find Doctor Waterman in Chicago today were vain.

It was thought not unlikely that Milwaukee is the doctor's temporary place of residence and that he is conducting negotiations with his wife.

Miss Loftus and Doctor Waterman were married in London in June, 1909.

Mrs. Waterman's first matrimonial venture was with Justin Hauntly McCarty, dramatist and poet. They were divorced in 1900 in Philadelphia.

### GENERAL ROU SEIZES RANKS OF REBEL ARMY

#### Mexican Revolution Passes From Organized Campaign Into Guerrilla Warfare

#### Refugees and Troops Pile Into Juarez While Orozco Makes Last United Stand

JUAREZ, Mex., July 5.—The transitional stage of the Mexican revolution—its passage from an organized military campaign into a guerrilla warfare—brought nearly 2,000 rebel troops here today en route to Casas Grandes and the region along the Mexican Northwestern railroad, about 100 miles southwest of the border.

Hundreds of women and children, mostly refugees from Chihuahua City, now in the hands of the federal government, came with the troops. Homeless, they camped in the streets tonight, cooking their meals on curbs and sleeping in the open.

General Pascual Orozco, the rebel chief, spent the day at Sauz, 30 miles north of Chihuahua, giving final orders to 3,500 cavalry, which he directed westward across country toward Casas Grandes and the state of Sonora, now the rebel objective. He will arrive in Juarez tomorrow. Three of the five troop trains which left Bachimba, where the federals defeated the rebel army two days ago, had reached here at 6 o'clock. Two more were on their way and in one of these General Orozco was said to be coming.

Governor Felipe Gutierrez and members of the rebel legislature arrived today. Those who witnessed the battle of Bachimba declare the federals have every advantage, driving the rebels away long before they intended to retreat. When the last troop train was pulled out of Bachimba, a scattered fire from federal cavalry was directed at it, the passengers calling frantically to the engineer for speed.

Even late last night firing from the federal cavalry outside the city of Chihuahua is said to have been heard, heralding the approach of the federal vanguard.

#### Rebels Marching to Sonora

AGUA PRIETA, Sonora, Mex., July 5.—Advices reached here tonight that 1,500 rebels had left Casas Grandes, marching toward the Sonora state line. General Sanjines, the federal commander, announced that he had abandoned his plan for an attack on Juarez and would distribute his forces now in defense of the mountain passes leading into Sonora until General Huerta can bring the government forces up from the south for a general attack on the rebels.

#### Attack on Plant Denied

EL PASO, Tex., July 5.—Colonel Pascual Orozco Sr., father of the rebel chief, denied today the report from Washington that the rebels would direct artillery fire across the international line to destroy the plant of an El Paso electric lighting company. The story has been in circulation here for

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### ROW DEVELOPS AT HEARING ON JUDGE HANFORD

#### Minority Member of Committee Objects to Method of Taking Evidence

#### Chairman Announces That In- quiry Is Intended to Incrim- inate

SEATTLE, July 5.—The majority of the house judiciary subcommittee (Representatives James M. Graham of Illinois and Walter I. McCoy of New Jersey) came into open conflict today with the minority member (Representative Edwin W. Higgins of Connecticut) over the manner of conducting the inquiry into the conduct of United States Judge Cornelius H. Hanford.

McCoy told of rumors that evidence was being suppressed and witnesses intimidated. Chairman Graham announced that the committee was seeking "incriminating" evidence.

The disagreement has been noted from the opening day, but today Chairman Graham referred to himself and McCoy as the majority and took occasion to state vigorously that the majority would rule.

#### Judge Drunk, Says Witness

Charles F. Peterson, a timber and coal land dealer, was called to the stand and testified that he had seen Judge Hanford under the influence of intoxicating liquor. One night about eight months ago, he said, he went into a barroom in First avenue and saw Judge Hanford leaning on the bar in an intoxicated condition, with his left arm on the bar and a glass in front of him.

"He resembled a man who was drunk," said the witness. "There is no question in my mind that he was drunk."

On a later occasion, the witness testified, he saw Judge Hanford leaning on the bar of a Second avenue saloon at 11 at night with both arms on the bar. "There is no question in my mind that the man was very drunk," said the witness.

Two months ago, the witness testified, in a third barroom, he saw Judge Hanford at 5 in the afternoon, leaning on the bar, drunk. Two weeks ago, the witness testified, he saw Judge Hanford apparently intoxicated, walking north in Second avenue with former United States Senator Samuel H. Piles.

"If he wasn't drunk, the Judge was approaching that condition very rapidly," witness testified.

#### Higgins Shows Anger

Here Hanford's counsel cross examined witness concerning his motive in appearing and Representative McCoy asked leave to state that witness appeared as a result of a conference with him (McCoy) and Chairman Graham. Representative Higgins wished it to be noted that he was not a party to the conference and spoke with anger.

McCoy explained that Higgins was in Tacoma, else he should have been consulted. In answer to McCoy's question, Peterson described the conference.

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### INFATUATED MAN KILLS 4 AND SELF

#### Forbidden to Pay Attention to Niece, He Slays Brother and His Family

DAWSON, N. T., July 5.—Eugene Vaglio, aged 45, today killed his brother, John Vaglio, proprietor of the Central hotel; his brother's wife and their two children, Rosa, aged 16, and Christina, aged 9, and then committed suicide.

Eugene Vaglio was infatuated with his niece, Rosa, and had been forbidden by her parents to enter the house. The murderer went to the hotel with two pistols and a dagger, evidently determined to slay all his brother's family.

He found Mrs. Vaglio in the kitchen, followed her to her bedroom and shot her there. The husband was killed in bed. Christina rushed to the door and was shot down, and Rosa was slain in bed. The murderer then cut his own throat with the dagger and blew out his brains with a pistol shot. All five persons were found dead in one room.

### WORLD'S AERO RECORD MADE IN GERMANY

#### Aviator and Four Passengers in Air 33 Min. 42 Secs.

LEIPZIG, Germany, July 5.—The German aviator, Schirmmeister, today established a new world's record for duration of time in the air with four passengers. His machine remained aloft 33 minutes and 42 seconds. The previous record under similar conditions—32 minutes and 33 seconds—was made by Hoffman at Johannisthal on March 8. Ulrich established a new world's record with two passengers—2 hours and 41 minutes. The previous record, 2 hours and 2 minutes, was held by himself.

### DEATH RIDES IN ON WAVE OF HEAT

#### Several Fatalities Are Reported in Chicago, Now Sweeter- ing and Suffering

CHICAGO, July 5.—Chicago is sweltering and suffering in the first protracted heat wave of the year and deaths are beginning to accumulate. Several persons have expired as a result of the hot wave which struck the city yesterday and continued with unabated fierceness today, and many other were prostrated.

While Chicagoans sought the shady side of the streets and rushed to the parks and other retreats the humidity ranged around 80, which intensified the suffering from the heat itself.

For a time today it was thought that the high mark of yesterday, 89, would be equaled, but until midafternoon 87 was the best the mercury could do in that direction.

### BEAUTIFUL GIRL TRIES TO COMMIT SUICIDE

#### Mystery Veils Richly Gowned Woman's Act

SACRAMENTO, July 5.—A girl of unusual beauty, who gives the name of Miss Roberts King, but refuses to divulge the names of her parents or her residence, attempted suicide in a room at the Hotel Land here today by stabbing herself in the abdomen with a pen-knife. She is now in the county hospital and is expected to recover. She was to have become a mother in two or three months, and worry over her condition and the impending shame caused her to seek to end her life.

### IOWA SOLON WILL STAY IN LINE

#### Senator Cummins Says Third Party Can Not Secure Re- forms Demanded by People

#### WILL WORK FOR TAFT AND BETTER POLICIES

#### Colonel Capers of South Carolina, Former Roosevelt Leader, Will Remain Regular

#### WILLIAM BARNES MAY MANAGE G. O. P. CAMPAIGN

WASHINGTON, July 5.—Senator Cummins of Iowa, progressive republican candidate for the presidential nomination at the Chicago convention, today formally declared against the new party movement led by Theodore Roosevelt and announced his allegiance to the old party.

In so doing Cummins declared bosses could not be escaped by organization of new parties and that to those republicans, who, after intelligent inquiry, conclude that President Taft's renomination was the result of fraudulent votes, "the nominee of the convention is not the nominee of the republican party."

He pointed out, however, that dis-appointment or individual dishonesty can not be a foundation of a new party.

John G. Capers of this city, South Carolina member of the republican national committee, who supported Colonel Roosevelt at Chicago, also formally announced his intention to support President Taft's candidacy.

Capers, in a statement, said the work of the majority of the national committee "was not one whit more severe than the steam roller methods of four years ago."

#### Ran Roller Under Roosevelt

"At that time," he said, "in behalf of Candidate Taft and under the direction of President Roosevelt, I was one of the engineers of the machine and helped flatten out the minority of the committee, who were in the same condition when we got through with them as were the 15 men of the committee at the Chicago convention at this time."

Capers was one of the 15. "There will always be a steam roller in the national committees of both parties," he said, "until the just and fair thing is done providing for the new national committee to make up the temporary roll and assume office before the convention nominates for president."

Senator Cummins' statement was his first public utterance since the Chicago convention renominated President Taft. Cummins pointed out that throughout his public life he had been fighting to make the republican party the progressive party of the country and that while he had never hesitated to denounce party policies when he believed them to be wrong, or to criticize party leaders, he had always believed and still believed the republican party offered more hope for substantial progress toward good government than any other political organization.

#### Problems Can Be Solved

"I believe," he said, "that we can solve the problems before us more quickly and more successfully through the republican party than through any other political organization."

"It was only a short while ago that the progressive movement in the republican party took on definite form, and yet at this time three-fourths of the republican states are in the hands of the progressive republican organizations and the membership of the party is overwhelmingly with us."

"We met defeat in Chicago simply because we had not concentrated our energies upon abolition of a false and unjust basis of representation; but the basic can and will be overthrown and

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
