Women Fail to Get Criminal Probation

OAKLAND, July 23.—Petitions signed by members of the G. A. R. and the Women's Relief corps of Berkeley, presented by a committee, were features of an appeal to save Walter L. Howe, aged 28 years, from the penitentiary, in Judge Waste's court today.

After balancing the conflicting sides, Judge Waste sentenced Howe to serve one year in San Quentin penitentiary, the minimum punishment.

"If I were influenced by this petition and by the words of this committee to releasing this defendant on probation, it would be a question of the fate of the system," said Judge Waste. "On the other hand it is an unpleasant process to send a young man to the penitentiary."

CITY COUNCIL GOES ON STRIKE

Building Trades Council Ties Up Work on Oakland's New Municipal Building

OAKLAND, July 23.—The employment of nonunion teamsters by a subcontractor for delivering material to the new city hall resulted in a walk-out today of 150 men employed on the structure.

Heretofore union men have been employed on all the work and the city guaranteed that all the work would be done by them.

Concrete work was stopped temporarily two months ago and no further rock was delivered until last Monday. Blake & Bilger used a number of nonunion teamsters in the work.

A conference was held this afternoon in Mayor Mott's office by Mott, Donovan, Lloyd and Percy Stewart, representing the Roebing construction company, which has the contract for the concrete work and sublet the hauling of the rock to Blake & Bilger.

Mayor Mott does not anticipate any long delay and believes that most of the workmen will be back tomorrow.

S. P. MAY OWN NEW RICHMOND LINE

RICHMOND, July 23.—Under the terms of the franchise, work on the proposed electric railroad in Cutting boulevard and Tenth street must begin by August 15.
