## VOTE IN CITY TOTALS 64,492

### Johnson-Finn Machine Cinches Its Hold At Primaries

Complete figures for Tuesday's primary election in San Francisco show a comparatively small vote. The result was a victory for the Johnson-Finn political machine.

The total vote cast was 64,492. Of this number 40,658 were republican, 11,976 democratic and 2,817 socialist. On the republican side the Taft forces nominated one congressman, one senator and two assemblymen. The Roosevelt faction nominated one congressman, two senators and eleven assemblymen. On the democratic side the Bell forces nominated two congressmen, two senators and three assemblymen, while the McNab forces nominated one senator and ten assemblymen.

## JUDGE REPRIMANDS FRIENDS OF COURT

### Long Objections to Accounting of Guardian of Ketter Heirs Are Overruled

SAN RAFAEL, Sept. 4.—A long step toward the end of the protracted legal controversy between S. H. Cheda, guardian of the minor heirs of the late William Ketter, and Mrs. Mary E. Ketter Sheerin, their mother, was taken today when Superior Judge Zook overruled as lengthy list of objections to Cheda's twelfth accounting filed at the instance of Mrs. Sheerin by Attorney Gilbert D. Boalt in the capacity of amicus curiae.

In overruling the objections the court took occasion to reprimand Boalt for his action in appearing in a case as "friend of the court" with charges that had not been sworn to and for which no proof was presented. Judge Zook stated from the bench that the next time an amicus curiae came into his court he must bring "charges based on direct knowledge and not on rumor or hearsay."

Another bill of exceptions and objections to Cheda's last accounting filed by Attorneys Myer Jacobs and Arthur J. Dannenbaum in behalf of the Union Trust company of San Francisco, guardian of the two oldest Ketter children, was argued and amended in court with the result that all the contested items were disposed of to the satisfaction of both sides except some matters relating to expenditures previously reported by Cheda and which are the subject of a suit pending in the district court of appeal.

With these matters out of the way, the attorneys spent the remainder of the morning arguing on an item of \$1,400 asked by Cheda as the expense he incurred in defending himself as guardian in a previous suit brought by Mrs. Sheerin, and an item of \$2,100 asked by Dannenbaum & Jacobs, who brought the previous suit against Cheda. Attorney Thomas Boyd, for Cheda, opposed the claim of Dannenbaum & Jacobs on the ground that Mrs. Sheerin's contest had not been made in good faith, while Dannenbaum opposed the claim on the ground that the guardian had no right to go to the expense of defending such a suit. Both claims were taken under advisement by the court.

## GIRL HELPS BANDIT HOLD UP HER ESCORT

### Park "Spoonster" Becomes Unwilling Aid of Robber

DENVER, Colo., Sept. 4.—Threatening to shoot her if she disobeyed, a highwayman forced Miss Blanche Edwards of this city to assist in his flight through the pockets of her escort, Edward O'Neill, in one of the city's parks and turn what money she found over to the robber. The girl, after taking them to police station to answer a charge of violating an ordinance forbidding spooning in the public parks, the highwayman held up and robbed another couple who caught the robber refused to give his name, saying he would not disgrace his wife and three children.

## AUTO BANDITS CARRY DYNAMITE FOR HOLDUP

### Band Frightened Away When Freightcars Appear

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 4.—Three bandits plentifully supplied with high explosives in an automobile, way in with 12 miles east of here last night for a New Orleans and Cincinnati express on the Louisville and Nashville railroad. When they heard the puffing of a locomotive they set their plans in motion but after they had halted the locomotive they found it was hauling freight cars. Covering their retreat with leveled guns they made off in their automobile.

## OCEAN PARK LOSS ABOUT \$2,200,000

### Founder of Resort "Broke," but With Financial Backing for Rebuilding

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 4.—Insurance adjusters seeking to ascertain the damage done by the fire that devastated the Ocean Park last night placed the loss to buildings at approximately \$1,200,000. The loss to contents of the 225 buildings that were destroyed is placed at approximately another million dollars.

The heaviest individual loser was A. R. Fraser, founder of the resort and principal owner of the "million dollar pier," of which there remains only the concrete supports. He also owned the Decatur Hotel block, and he placed his total loss at slightly more than \$1,000,000, with only \$20,000 insurance, which was carried on the hotel.

H. R. Gage is the next heaviest loser. He estimated his loss at \$125,000, with about \$5,000 insurance. The city council of Santa Monica, in which a part of the burned area is included, met today and decided on a \$25,000 bond issue to install a new fire system. It was also voted to raise the tax rate because of the loss to the city exchequer from concession licenses.

Hundreds of men are clearing away the debris tonight and more will be put to work tomorrow, the Pacific Electric system having offered to provide men and cars free of charge. The "Strand" and business section will be rebuilt.

"I am broke," said Fraser tonight, "but Los Angeles capitalists have placed \$1,000,000 at my disposal for rebuilding a better Ocean Park."

## HEIRS OF SOLDIER WILL GET \$600,000

### Big Fortune Consists of Estate Left in Time of American Revolution

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—Robert T. Way, a clerk employed by the old Dominion Railway company, has learned from Denver that he and his two brothers and one sister, who are in reduced circumstances, are heirs to an estate there worth approximately \$600,000.

Manuel Axson and Jacob Samuel Axson came to this city together from England during the American revolution. The former went west and the latter settled in Georgia. They soon lost track of each other. Jacob took up arms against his former countryman and after the war was rewarded for his services by the government with a grant of land worth about \$30,000.

The Denver land records are said to show that his brother died in that city in 1825, when he was nearly 100 years old. He left on deposit about \$5,000 and owned considerable land which since has greatly enhanced in value. The cash in the bank has drawn interest ever since.

## WOMAN WOUNDED BY ACCIDENT WITH PISTOL

### LARKSPUR, Sept. 4.—Mrs. Frank DeWue was accidentally shot by her husband today when the latter was cleaning a revolver. The bullet entered the woman's back. She was taken to a San Francisco hospital for treatment.

## BELL BEATEN BY BOURBONS

### McNab Forces Control County Democratic Organization

The Taft republicans did no better than the Bell democrats in their fight for control of their respective party organizations. The Taft republicans captured only two assembly districts from the third termers, the thirtieth and the thirty-first districts, while the Bell democrats led the McNab forces only in the thirtieth and thirty-third districts.

As a result of the vote for delegates to the county conventions of the two parties the Roosevelt voters will control the republican county organization by 19 to 13 delegates and the McNab forces will hold the whip hand in the democratic organization with a lead of 110 to 29 delegates.

The following table shows the number of delegates elected in each assembly district by each faction of the two parties and also gives the factional vote of each party in each of the districts.
