The oppressive weather seemed to sap the ginger from each and every individual on the two teams. Possibly they lost all their steam in practice; at any rate, when they trotted out for the game they just stilled around and lolled a bit. Nobody seemed to care much, either. It was only a warmup for the crowd.

It must be said for the Seals that they ran the bases in far better style than they did on the previous day. They did not try that old bunting stunt at all, but just waded in and smacked the ball as sweetly as opportunity—and they were successful enough in their efforts, especially with men on the sacks. Most of the boys got off for themselves without much trouble.

He is going to bring this matter before the National association and if possible make that body go to the bat with him and demand that the big fellows pay for their umpires just as they pay for their players. Ewing believes that the others will stick with him.

This matter was brought up last year, and Ewing was for it strongly. However, it did not carry for the reason that it was not made a big issue. Ewing spent most of his time at the last session in securing the class AA rating for the league, the International League and the American association. It was a hard battle, but he came out with the wreath of victory adorning his head.

For catchers they will pick from Berry, Schmidt, Sepulveda, Auer and Kuhn, and they think that they will be able to get two good men from this flock. Then they have Fanning, Delhi, Howard, Baker, and looking for them just as they look for toasters, and when a live one makes his appearance he generally is grabbed up. The minor league does not even get a thank you from the big moguls.

Johnston of the American league announced the other day that he had signed Gene McGreevy, the former Coast league official, though the league is still in the process of signing to this league. It is also known that Johnston wants Hildebrand. When Ewing learned this he tossed his sky and directed himself as ready for the fray.

For infield positions quite a squad will fight it out. There are on the list Howard at first, Fitzgerald at second, Corban at short, Wuffli at third and McArdle and McAvoy as holdovers. Ewing says he will get at least one big league infielder and also a couple of pitchers. He is regular for regular men and two utility performers—just what he is carrying now.

The outlook outside is also bright. Gedeon goes to the Athletics to be eliminated, but McIntyre, Mundorf, Williams, Felts and at least one big league pitcher, together with a couple from the brush, are to be tried out in the big league. He is carrying a list of a case of the survival of the fittest, and it looks as though Reidy should be able to get together a competent flock from this array.
