Exposition Authorities Receive Bids for Construction of Service Building

Ohio will be the next state to select its site for its participation in the Panama-Pacific exposition.

President Charles C. Moore received a telegram yesterday from Governor Harmon in which he said that he would be accompanied by John Upl Lloyd, R. E. McCarthy and F. E. Myers; also by his wife and his daughter, Mrs. Wright.

BIDS FOR SERVICE BUILDING

Bids for the erection of the service building, the first structure to be erected on the exposition site, were received by the buildings and grounds committee yesterday.

THREE STORY STRUCTURE

This structure will be three stories in height and will be 150 feet square, with an interior court of 55 feet by 104 feet.

The first floor will be occupied by the auditor, treasurer, railroad, installation of exhibits, admissions and concessions, information and telegraph departments.

The second and third floors will be devoted to the architectural department and the second floor of the south wing to the engineering, mechanical, electrical and civil engineering departments.

The main wing of the building will be occupied by the director of works and his staff and the adviser and chief of sculpture, color and decorations.

The third floor will be used for blue printing, photography and color studios.

It is expected that this building will be completed by the first of the year and many of the departments immediately will take up their new quarters.

NEIL SCHMIDT WINS MORE LAURELS

Young Athlete Is as Fresh at End as At Start

Analysis of Figures In Feat of Miss Schmidt



Neil Schmidt of Alameda has long been credited as being the greatest woman swimmer the Pacific coast has ever seen, but her performance yesterday of swimming almost a mile round the Seal rocks off the Cliff House, fighting the tides and current rips all the way, and doing the distance in 34 minutes 50 seconds, is a feat worthy of being heralded to the world at large.

water. It is doubtful if even Miss Vera Neave of England, holder of the world's record for the mile, could outdistance the Alameda wonder. The course yesterday was about 200 yards short of a full mile, and when it is considered that it was covered in 34 minutes and 50 seconds, against strong tides and treacherous current rips, the merit of the performance is apparent when compared with Miss Neave's world record for the mile of 31 minutes 41.4 seconds.

POMEROY'S PERFORMANCE


To bring the comparison down to local performances, it will be remembered that Walter Pomeroy of the Olympic club swam round the three rocks below the Cliff House on January 1, in 32 minutes 44 seconds. Yesterday Miss Schmidt went one better than Pomeroy by swimming around all four rocks, or 600 yards farther than Pomeroy swam—and her time was only 2 minutes 50 seconds worse.

CREDIT TO CAPTAIN NELSON

To a very great degree the captain and his crew shared the honors of the day with Miss Schmidt. The captain instructed the swimmer as to the best course to follow and recommended her taking the outside of the rocks first and then finishing close in to the Cliff House shore and avoiding the tides as much as possible.

The captain's ideas worked out to a nicety. Once away from the rips off the northward rock, everything was plain sailing, and the girl finished up at the beach in as good condition as when she started nearly 35 minutes previously.

Early in the morning Miss Schmidt, accompanied by her mother and her sister Rose, went out to the beach and prepared for the task, then sat on the sand awaiting the proper condition of the tides for the start. After the swim she was naturally jubilant, but, as has

been the case with all her previous triumphs, she was modest in her victory and had little to say. She said, however, that the swim yesterday was nothing as compared with her voyage across the bay on August 11.

EASIER THAN BAY SWIM

"If I had to make the choice of swimming one or the other again," she said, "I would certainly choose the Seal rocks. The bay swim is the hardest one I have ever done, but if my record is broken next Sunday by the girls entering I certainly shall go after the new mark."

FEDERAL GRAND JURY FINDS SIX INDICTMENTS

Four Bills Are Against Alleged Smugglers of Chinese

William Gerrald, A. A. Lloyd, Lee Yip Nam and Wong Chue were indicted by the federal grand jury yesterday for conspiring to smuggle Chinese from Mexico into the United States. The indictments charge that on July 12, 1912, the defendants brought 22 Chinese on the launch "Three Cs" from Mexico to San Clemente Island and that ten of these Chinese eventually were brought to Oakland harbor for the purpose of being landed, but were captured by the immigration authorities, who were in command of the "Three Cs" and were pretending to be among the conspirators.

Lorraine Sherman also was indicted for forging a postal money order for \$45, which she is alleged to have cashed at the Emporium. She is accused of taking the letter that contained the money order from the letter rack at the Hotel Dale, where she was stopping.

Excellent Shooting Marks Practice With the Shore Batteries

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—Officers and enlisted men in the army absent from duty on account of disability resulting from drunkenness or any other form of dissipation, will forfeit pay during their absence. If it is impracticable to determine within the month that if the absence was due to cause which should deprive the soldier of his pay he will not be permitted to draw pay for that or any subsequent month until the cause of the absence has been determined.
