RESEARCH WORK IN EAST DISCUSSED

H. A. Mason Addresses the Committees of City Club of Berkeley

BERKELEY, Oct. 1.—H. A. Mason, secretary of the League of California Municipalities, spoke this evening at a meeting of the committees of the City Club, held at a local cafe. Mason's address, following dinner, dealt with "Bureaus of Municipal Research and Public Efficiency." He told of work that had been done at the University of Wisconsin, where a division of the university provides expert advice for municipal and state officials, and described the functions of the bureau of municipal research of New York, and other institutions of the nature.
