Oaks Take Vengeance in Afternoon Transbay Tribe Pull Cactus Henley's Thorns

Long Slabster Batted to All Corners of Lot By Commuters; Pernoll Invulnerable

The heads of the Oaks were bowed in shame as they walked off the field on their own sacred lot yesterday morning with a 3 to 1 Seal drubbing plastered on their backs; but the afternoon after the morning loss was one of glory and pride. The plaster was switched to the backs of the Seals, who were fairly weighted down with it, for the figure 3 was transformed into a 7, and the 1 still held good. Had Vernon been able to wrestle a victory away from the Senators, there might not have been quite as much of a celebration in the transbay city last evening; but Vernon fell down, 2 to 1, in its final clash with the lowly tribe of Van Buren.
