TROOPS CHARGE WITH BAYONETS

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 25.—Stories of desperate hand to hand fighting between the Bulgarians and the Turks are told in newspaper dispatches reaching here from Adrianople. Great losses were suffered on both sides in the battles around that city on Tuesday and Wednesday.

On the other side of the peninsula Zekki Pasha, with an army of 20,000 Turks, is reported to have attacked the Serbian army north of Kumanova just as a large force of Bulgarians was about to effect a junction with it.

SERBS ATTACK FOES WITH KNIVES

BELGRADE, Serbia, Oct. 25.—The crown prince of Serbia was in charge of the artillery during the battle at Kumanova, in which the Serbs claim to have won a great victory over the Turks, inflicting a loss of 5,000 men, 12 guns and an enormous amount of ammunition.


